BY-LAWS (1-B)

of
THE CHRISTIAN SCIENCE STUDENTS'
ASSOCIATION OF THE PUPILS
of
MR. NEIL H. BOWLES, C.S.B.

ARTICLE I-NAME

Section 1. This Association shall be known as "The Christian Science Students' Association of the Pupils of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B."

ARTICLE II-PURPOSE

Section 1. The purpose of this association is to enable this body of students of Christian Science to further in Christian fellowship the spiritual welfare of its members by convening annually in accordance with the provisions of the Manual of The Mother Church by Mary Baker Eddy, and the ardent desire of their teacher, Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B. Thus is the prosperity of the Cause promoted through this department of its Christianly scientific educational system.

Section 2. Duties: It shall be the duty and privilege of each member to attend the annual meetings of this association. Members shall always hold as strictly confidential the letters and teaching of their teacher, of others who may address the meetings, and the affairs of the association. The Secretary-Treasurer shall be notified promptly of any changes of address.

ARTICLE III-ADMINISTRATION

Section 1. Officers: The officers of the association shall consist of a President, Mr. Neil H. Bowles, an Executive Committee consisting of six members, three men and three women, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 2. Appointments and Elections: The members of the Executive Committee and the Secretary-Treasurer shall be appointed by the President to serve until such time as their successors are appointed by the President. In the event the association shall be without its President, vacancies on the Executive Committee shall be filled in the following manner:

Elections shall be held annually starting one year from the first association meeting following the Executive Committee's assumption of the management of the association. At that time, one man and one woman of the committee, as it is then composed, shall retire and one man and one woman shall be elected to fill

the vacancies. The two members who are to retire shall be the two whose names are alphabetically nearest to the beginning of the alphabet. The same procedure shall be followed for the next two years until the original members of the committee shall be retired.

As the term of one man and one woman expires each year, the Executive Committee shall act as a nominating committee in the selection of new members to that committee for a three year term in the following manner:

After prayerful consideration has been given as to who may be best able to serve the association, and after determining who among them is able and willing to serve, a ballot shall be prepared containing the names of three men and three women, arranged in alphabetical order, with a space for writing in additional names. Such ballot shall be mailed to the members and returned to the Secretary-Treasurer not later than the date indicated thereon.

The man and woman receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected for a three year term or, if for any reason there is a delay in an election, they shall continue to serve until the new committee has met and organized. In the event of a tie vote the Executive Committee shall then ballot and it shall require four votes of that Committee to resolve the tie.

A vacancy occurring at any other time than that of the annual election shall be filled, for the unexpired term, by a vote of the Executive Committee using the names from the nominations made at the last previous election. A period of three years must elapse before a member of the Executive Committee is eligible for reelection.

In the absence of its President, the Executive Committee shall appoint annually a Secretary-Treasurer and determine the salary for said position.

Section 3. Duties of Executive Committee: The Executive Committee shall perform such duties as are requested of it by the President. If. the President should no longer be present; the Executive Committee shall exercise management of this association. They shall elect their chairman from their own number for a period of one year, who shall cast an additional deciding ballot in case of a tie vote. The chairman shall conduct the yearly session of the association. They shall carefully inquire into the qualifications of available addressers for the association meetings and shall elect yearly one, well qualified, to address the association. Satisfactory ad- dressers may be invited again for other years, but only one year at a time. Three years, however, would be a reasonable limit for the same addresser to serve. The Executive Committee shall have the power to appoint such committees as may be desirable. At the annual business meeting, the Executive Committee shall submit a brief report of their activities.

Section 4. Duties of the Secretary-Treasurer:

The Secretary-Treasurer shall perform the duties of the office as directed by the President. When elected by the Executive Committee, the Secretary-Treasurer shall be custodian of all records and serve as an Executive-Secretary. Correct account of the receipt and disbursement of funds shall be kept, and financial reports furnished to the Executive Committee semi-annually, and to the members of the association annually. All monies disbursed shall be under the supervision of the Executive Committee. Checks shall be signed by the Secretary-Treasurer and by the chairman of the Executive Committee. The books shall be audited annually by a committee of three competent members.

ARTICLE IV-MEETINGS

Section 1. Membership: The association shall convene annually at a time and meeting place in Atlanta, Georgia, or vicinity to be designated by the President, or in his absence, by the Executive Committee, in a notice to each member at his or her last known address. When acting under this Section, the Executive Committee shall have such notices mailed to the members not later than six months prior to the date of such meeting. The Executive Committee shall not call more frequent meetings. Twenty-five percent of the membership at the date of meetings conducted by the Executive Committee shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of the business.

Section 2. Executive Committee: When exercising management of this association, the Executive Committee shall meet annually immediately after each session of the association and confer by letter during the year as may be necessary.

ARTICLE V-DUES

Section 1. **Dues:** The association dues shall be announced from time to time, as necessity may require changes. The amount shall be due and payable the first of the calendar year.

Section 2. Funds: The Executive Committee shall maintain such funds as the association from time to time may create.

ARTICLE VI-RULES OF PROCEDURE

Section 1. When operating under the management of the Executive Committee, the rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern all meetings of this association when they are not inconsistent with these bylaws.

Section 2. Amendments: Proposed amendments to these bylaws shall be in writing and may be submitted at any time to the Executive Committee. They shall then carefully consider them and submit them in writing with their recommendations to the members. All proposed changes shall be included with the call to the

annual meeting next following. The affirmative vote of two-thirds of those present and voting at such meetings shall be necessary to adopt any amendments.

Section 3. Order of Business: When operating under the management of the Executive Committee, the order of business at the annual sessions of this association shall be as follows:

- 1. Devotional Exercises
- 2. Reading of the minutes
- 3. Report of the Treasurer
- 4. Communications
- 5. Reports of the Committees
- 6. Unfinished business
- 7. New business
- 8. Morning part of the address
- 9. Lunch
- 10. Afternoon part of the address
- 11. Closing by chairman.

(This order of business may be modified at any business meeting of the association by a two-thirds vote.)

Your teacher cannot foresee a time or a situation when it would be desirable to amend these bylaws. A democratic and businesslike way of conducting the affairs of this association is provided for in these bylaws. If members will keep human will out of the way and realize that the only purpose of this association is to provide spiritual growth for them, business sessions will always be held to a minimum of time, about thirty minutes, and harmony will characterize their meetings.

Remember, you are always peacemakers.

MEMO TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

In the event that I should no longer be with you in person and should not have left a prepared address for the next Association meeting, it is my wish that Mrs. Bowles read my 1961 address entitled, "Making Spirit More Real to the Human Consciousness." In the event that Mrs. Bowles were unable to do so, then I ask that Mrs. Loretta Burdick be invited to do so. Only a few members of the Association have heard this address and have resumes of it.

MEMO TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE:

At the time of the disbanding of Neil H. Bowles Association, all funds on hand are to be turned over to the Neil H. Bowles Association of Students Irrevocable Trust with The Mother Church already established.

MEMO

TO THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE OF Neil H. Bowles Association

On August 26, 1958, I wrote to the Christian Science Board of Directors as follows:

"Inclosed is the annual letter to your Board from my Association of Students, together with a check of \$500.00 as an expression of love and loyalty for The Mother Church.

"I am also inclosing a second check for \$1,000.00 to be used in establishing a Trust Fund in the name of Association of Students of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B. This fund is to be used to promote the welfare of the Association and should be so established as to ultimately have the residue of the fund go as a gift to The Mother Church.

"For your information in setting up the Trust, the Executive Committee of the Association acts only in an advisory capacity to the teacher and is not at this time invested with any authority.

"It is with much gratitude that we are able to establish this fund and have it as an eventual gift to The Mother Church."

This fund was established, as you all know, and the history of it is contained in our files.

The purpose of the fund was to be two-fold. 1- To provide additional income for the Association when it would be small in number and the annual dues might not be adequate to well support the work of the office and pay for the best possible addressers. It was anticipated that at that time the income from the principal alone would be adequate to supplement the dues, and we would never have to draw on the principal of the Therefore the entire principal would eventually go to The Mother Church as a gift from the Association. 2 - One of the sources of income for The Mother Church has always been yearly gifts from Christian Science associations of pupils, and The Mother Church has counted on them, so the second reason for the establishment of these funds is to provide income for The Mother Church after the associations are disbanded. We have requested that the trust fund from this Association be allocated to the trust fund for the support of The Christian Science Monitor.

This Association has always been very generous each year in adding to our Trust, and it would be my great hope that it would always have an inspired sense of continuing with this important activity of the Association.

At this date the Association has been contributing \$1,000.00 each year to The Mother Church as an outright gift, and about \$10,000.00 a year has been paid to our Trust. As of September 30, 1983, the market value of our Trust was \$117,183. Up to the present date the income from the Trust has been turned back into the principal.

On March 23, 1984, a request came from The Mother Church asking that we convert our revocable trust into an irrevocable trust. The correspondence on this is all in the file. We complied with their request and asked that the Association now begin to receive the income from the trust so that we could build a security fund of our own and at the same time continue to make our substantial gifts to the trust in Boston.

As Chair of the Executive Committee, I sought information from The Mother Church Board of Education regarding instructions for disposition of assets when our association disbands. I first e-mailed Holly Bolon, Administrative Assistant/Special Project, Board of Education, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, 617-450-2014. She forwarded my questions to William Beard in TMC Legal Department. Here is his e-mailed response:

Hi Diana,

Thank you for providing a copy of the association's bylaws and Mr. Bowles' memo to the Executive Committee dated September 24, 1984 with respect to distributing all funds on hand at the time of disbanding to the "Neil H. Bowles Association of Students Irrevocable Trust with The Mother Church already established." These documents are very helpful in the following regard:

- 1. Article VI, Rules of Procedure, Section 2. Amendments in the bylaws provide a procedure by which to amend the bylaws.
- 2. I note Mr. Bowles' comment in this section that states "Your teacher cannot foresee a time or a situation when it would be desirable to amend these bylaws. A democratic and businesslike way of conducting the affairs of this association is provided in these bylaws."

You are wondering whether Mr. Bowles' written direction to the Executive Committee in regard to the distribution of funds upon the disbanding of the association is sufficient or if the bylaws should be amended to provide dissolution language.

While we cannot give you legal advice or direct how you should proceed, I can offer some points to consider, as follows.

- The association's members may not be aware of Mr. Bowles' written direction to the Executive Committee with respect to the distribution of funds on hand upon disbanding.
- The question of disbanding is for the individual association members to decide (See "Guidelines for Disbanding Associations" provided by the Board of Education attached).
- The issue of distributing the funds on hand at the time the association disbands is likely to be a matter of discussion by the members if they vote to disband.
- The Executive Board may wish to discuss whether it may be helpful for the orderly

operation of the association looking forward and in view of the democratic principles underlying the conduct of the association (since the President is no longer with you in person) to recommend that the members vote on amending the bylaws to provide a dissolution procedure, including the distribution of the funds on hand in accordance with Mr. Bowles' direction to the Executive Committee.

- If the association were to be formed today IRS rules require all nonprofit charitable organizations to include a dissolution provision in its organizational documents (Articles of Association, Articles of Incorporation, or Bylaws as the case may be) which provides that the charity's assets must be distributed to another charitable nonprofit organization having a similar charitable purpose (in this case organizations whose purpose is to promote and extend Christian Science).
- FYI, I searched the State of Georgia Secretary of State's website and it does not appear that your association is incorporated, therefore it does not appear that a dissolution plan would need to be field with the Secretary of State upon disbanding. The association appears to have been legally formed as an unincorporated nonprofit association. Having said that, Georgia state law may also require that a charitable nonprofit organization distribute its assets upon disbanding/dissolution to another charitable nonprofit organization having a similar charitable purpose (such as TMC). The Executive Committee may wish to confer with a licensed GA attorney if it has legal questions involving GA laws.

I hope that you find these points helpful.

GUIDELINES FOR DISBANDING ASSOCIATIONS

While our Leader, Mary Baker Eddy, made no specific provision in the *Church Manual* for the disbanding of an association, the time may come when an association wishes to do so, and this is a permissible step to take.

The question of disbanding is for the individual association members to decide. The executive committee can, if it wishes, apprise the remaining members of the current situation in the association, and by means of a simple ballot ask whether it is their wish to disband. In the spirit of democracy, however, before taking this final step, the committee might distribute a questionnaire to understand better the leadings and suggestions of its members, in the event that other solutions can be found. If a vote to disband is taken, the members can then be notified of the decision that was reached.

If the vote is to disband, the executive committee can actively encourage the members to attend another association meeting. In this spirit, it is helpful for the executive committee to give the members some form of written statement as to the status of the association, and confirming the fact that they have been members of it. (Sample wording is enclosed.) This information is often helpful to members in seeking individual invitations to attend the associations of other loyal teachers (or associations without a teacher), which they are privileged to do under Article XXVI, Section 7, of the *Church Manual*. An invitation can be requested on a yearly basis from any teacher whose association one desires to attend, or from the executive committee if the teacher is no longer present. No class-taught student, therefore, is deprived of the fresh inspiration to be gained from annual attendance at an association meeting.

When an association disbands, it's important that records and papers of possible value be distinguished from material which can be destroyed. The retention schedule on page 3 lists the kinds of documents desired for The Mother Church's historical files. They should be sent to:

In most countries, including the U.S., associations are tax-exempt organizations. When a tax-exempt organization terminates its activities, it generally must distribute its remaining assets to another tax-exempt organization with a similar purpose.

For this reason Christian Science pupils' associations should distribute their remaining assets to organizations whose purpose is to promote Christian Science and whose missions are consistent with those of the Church of Christ, Scientist. Such organizations include, but are not limited to:

The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts (The Mother Church)
Other Christian Science Pupils' Associations
Branch Churches of Christ, Scientist, or Christian Science Societies
Christian Science organizations at universities and colleges
Christian Science Committees on Publication

The association's by-laws should specifically designate where these assets should be distributed upon dissolution, including how any assets received by the association after its dissolution should be distributed (e.g., later estate gifts).

If there are questions or any complicating factors, it can be helpful for the association to consult with legal counsel when distributing its assets.

If assets are distributed to The Mother Church, please send to:

A letter, along with a check, should explain how the association would like for the assets to be disbursed, i.e., the General Fund, The Mother Church Endowment Fund, The Christian Science Monitor, etc.

For gifts of securities and money market funds, please call Gift Services at 617-450-3288.

If the association has incorporated under the laws of its state or country, it should also take legal steps to dissolve the corporate entity once the association has voted to disband. Again, it can be helpful for the association to consult with legal counsel when taking this step to dissolve.

BIOGRAPHICAL MATERIALS ABOUT YOUR TEACHER:

- 1. Biographical sketch of your teacher.
- 2. Memoirs/ Reminiscences of your teacher.
- 3. Photograph of your teacher (dated if possible).
- 4. List of articles by your teacher that appeared in the Christian Science periodicals.
- 5. List of other publications by your teacher.

INFORMATION ABOUT THE ASSOCIATION:

- 1. Bylaws of your association (if possible, please include current bylaws and a copy of all previous editions of the bylaws).
- 2. List of all students taught by your teacher.
- 3. Future bequests and gifts statement.
- 4. Executive committee records (these may include minutes and other documentation).

RETENTION SCHEDULE – (Continued)

OTHER HISTORICAL INFORMATION:

- 1. Material related to Mary Baker Eddy. This may include materials bearing her handwriting; we are also happy to check copies of letters written by Mrs. Eddy or items attributed to her, for accuracy and authenticity. Also, anecdotes about Mrs. Eddy, direct or indirect quotations from her, and any other related historical information may prove valuable. (We're happy to provide you with copies of any item you decide to donate to The Mother Church.)
- 2. Older files should be checked through with care. If you find historical references that seem unclear, please contact us; we'd be happy to give you information and/or documentation.

ASSOCIATION ADDRESSES:

The preservation of association addresses is an individual decision. Some associations ask for their retention in the Archives; others feel that addresses should not be retained. Those who choose to have their association's addresses retained in the Archives will be able to view the addresses by scheduling an in-person visit with the Office of Records Management at The Mother Church in Boston. All association addresses are considered confidential and are only viewable by the members of your association.

MATERIALS THAT CAN BE DESTROYED:

- All duplicate materials.
- Miscellaneous materials, for example class notes, letters, reports, and manuscripts are usually destroyed, but the ultimate decision is left to the association.
- Financial records, such as cancelled checks, receipts, bank statements, and invoices should be retained by a designee in your community for about seven years after dissolution. As retention laws vary by state and country, you may want to consult with an attorney on this point.

- 1 No one is to address the Association at any time who has
 in his or her background the false teaching (promoted by the
 Bliss Knapp group) that Mrs. Eddy is the woman of the Apocalypse. The Archives have the following statement written by
 Mrs. Eddy in 1896: "It (referring to that false concept) has
 no more validity than to fancy a statue of Liberty represented
 by a woman resembling some individual's form or face, then name
 it that individual." Mrs. Eddy's statement has also been
 quoted verbally in Normal Class by Richard J. Davis as "I am
 no more the woman of the Apocalypse than the Statue of Liberty
 is liberty." Mr. Bowles' Normal Class teacher was Richard
 Davis, who was taught by Bicknell Young, who was taught by
 Mr. Kimball. (The Cobb students have had the incorrect teaching.)
- 2 A paper which Mr. Bowles will prepare covering the six footsteps of treatment is to be read at every Association meeting.
 - 3 Mr. Bowles will select one or two of his former addresses from which the Executive Committee will make the final selection, and this may be read at the Association meeting the first year after the Executive Committee is activated. However, in subsequent years no former addresses are to be used.
 - 4 Mr. Bowles has asked that Loretta Burdick continue as permanent secretary of the Association for as long as she wishes to remain.

Keeping our association identity

MERYL L. HOLT

Students of Christian Science who have taken Primary class instruction (which is one of the happiest and most important of all human experiences) have the added gift of a lifetime membership in an association of the students. Although all teachers teach from the chapter "Recapitulation" in Science and Health by Mrs. Eddy, each teacher's presentation of the teaching is individual and unique. A respectful recognition of the distinct individuality and identity of each association helps us demonstrate the brotherly love that unites and embraces all students of this Science in the teaching found in our textbooks-the Bible and the writings of Mary Baker Eddy.

A shepherd and his flock

A close relationship exists between a teacher and his students and between the association members. This united group, following the inspired teaching they have been given, could be likened to what the Bible describes: "I will set up shepherds over them which shall feed them: and they shall fear no more, nor be dismayed, neither shall they be lacking, saith the Lord." What a privilege it is to be part of such a flock! We are assured in Science and Health: "The pure and uplifting thoughts of the teacher, constantly imparted to pupils, will reach higher than the heavens of astronomy..." 2

The teacher's guidance is continuous—not limited to the classroom or the yearly association meetings. The teacher's students share a common calling (1) to demonstrate individually and collectively the teachings of Christian Science; (2) to dedicate themselves to the furtherance of this Science; (3) to attend and support the yearly meetings of their association. The teacher stays with his

flock, and his flock is not to roam. This is limitation is a protection and a blessing.

Visiting other associations

Considering the fact that each pupil is best cared for at his own annual association meeting, and is needed there, why does Article XXVI, Section 7, in the Manual of The Mother Church by Mrs. Eddy; make a provision for pupils to attend each other's associations?

Certainly, this activity is too important to think of as a social visit. This provision covers the need of those who are temporarily unable to attend their own meeting. Another association may then invite them to hear its address. (They are not invited to the business part of the meeting.) This is a beautiful example of brotherly love within our Church. Visitors are grateful for the accommodation but do not "stay." It is a "visit." (The experience might be likened to that of a lamb separated from its flock: another shepherd finds it, cares for it, and return it to its right fold.)

Cherishing our association

Sometimes we might wonder about other associations—what they are doing how they are doing it, and how they compare to our association. Should we feel curious, let us remember that it is the message at our own association meeting that best cares for us. We do not need a look around for something different.

If we think we would like to attend another association because it is more convenient than our own, we would be wis to rethink why we chose our teached Convenience probably had little to do with it. We looked for the teacher who could best teach us, one we respected and wanted to learn from; prayerful though?

was given to the selection, and that selection includes our association membership.

A genuine desire to fulfill our commitment and attend our yearly meeting is a form-of prayer; it opens the way for us to attend. Under the guidance of divine Mind, we will find the way.

I had an opportunity to prove this a few years ago when a physical disorder threatened my association attendance: but the desire to meet with my fellow members and support the entire group with my presence overruled the suggestion of inconvenience or impossibility. With the loving help of a fellow member and the dedicated work of a practitioner, I made the trip successfully. Although able to sleep but little the night before the meeting, I felt refreshed when morning came. Taking a stand to be present at the meeting broke the mesmeric fear that appeared so limiting. I attended the meeting and listened to every word. This proved to be a turning point in the healing process, and I was soon completely free. The Bible promises: "A faithful man shall abound with blessings." 3

Because the Manual is God-inspired, we need to give special consideration to sheltering the student-teacher relationship. The journey from sense to Soul can be uniquely supported through a close and continued association with the teacher who has lovingly disciplined and instructed us.

We can cast aside personal attachment—whether to our own or another teacher—by knowing that divine Love governs us. Divine Love, Principle, understood and demonstrated, smooths our way; it elevates our affections and frees us from the impulses of corporeal personality. "In Science, divine Love alone governs man...," 4 Mrs. Eddy tells us.

Should problems arise within our association, or should there be need for improvement, our duty is not to run but to stay and work! This is the time to express love, compassion, humility, and patience—and to intelligently seek a solution. The Bible promises, "With God all things are possible." 5 Situations thus handled bless and strengthen our association and perfect our own experience.

If our teacher is no longer with us

We need to be especially on guard and resist the temptation to wander from our association when our teacher is no longer with us. "The tempter is vigilant, awaiting only an opportunity to divide the ranks of Christian Science and scatter the sheep abroad; but 'if God be for us, who can be against us?" "6 writes Mrs. Eddy. How important it is that we retain our association identity and not lose the fulfillment of its purpose!

One of the tempter's subtle suggestions is that guest speakers do not satisfy—that what we need is a real live teacher. What the tempter is actually saying is that the Manual of The Mother Church does not properly provide for associations with departed teachers or that we are unable to do our part in carrying out the provision. But Mrs. Eddy has stated in Article XXVII, Section 2, of the Manual, "Those beloved brethren whose teacher has left them, can elect an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association."

The fact is: We don't need a second teacher. The business of our association, the following of our association bylaws, the selecting of suitable speakers, the fellowship we have with one another, the

sharing of fruitage—all of these can show forth our teacher's teachings and the spirit of his or her loving counsel.

A guest speaker encourages us to continue in the way we have been taught. He makes us aware of the problems of the day and alerts us to work them out in a scientific way. The Manual provision for "an experienced Christian Scientist ... to conduct the meetings of their association," is God-directed, and it satisfies. We cannot improve on this provision. This By-Law prevents us from making the mistake of having two teachers. In referring to the action of her own students, our Leader, Mrs. Eddy, writes, "A general rule is, that my students should not allow their movements to be controlled by other students, even if they are teachers and practitioners of the same blessed faith." 7

At times a speaker's message may not satisfy because a student is grieving over the absence of his teacher. We make a good start in overcoming grief when we stop thinking of the guest speaker as a substitute for our teacher. No one can take our teacher's place, and no one needs to. The guest speaker is an addition to the scene. Through his inspiration we receive an impersonal message of the Christ (for good is not limited to or bestowed through or by mortals but is immortal and ever communicated through Mind, not a corporeal person).

There is an important difference between (1) association members going to other associations to hear an address, and (2) a speaker coming to the association. The latter leaves the association intact and supports its identity and that of its members, while the former tends to disperse the sheep abroad and may lead to a weakening of the association. Unnecessary visiting diverts students from their purpose and deprives them of the joy of being in their teacher's fold.

If we are actively practicing what we have been taught, we maintain a feeling of closeness to our teacher. A grateful, listening heart reaches out and feels the teacher's guidance. Although my teacher! passed on many years ago, his instruct tions are still guiding me. My association meetings are happy events, and we follow closely our teacher's teaching. Twict I have witnessed my fellow students unite in thought and action and thereby correct a mode of conduct that was not in accord with our teacher's instruction What a joy to see faithful students presing ahead!

Returning to one's association

If we have been out of touch with our association for quite a while, we need to find it hard to return. It is never too late to rejoin one's fold. An association needs its members, and the members need their association; this union is part of the structure of the Church. Love for ones teacher and gratitude for his teaching will open the way for the strayed member to go back to his flock. The students return will strengthen his demonstration of Church. It will also strengthen his as sociation and the whole Christian Science movement.

Membership in an association is a verspecial experience. Nothing can take it place. It is an inheritance to be valued and treasured.

An association meeting: a day of eternal remembrance

A universal truth undergirds the convening of a Christian Science Students Association. It impels both a student's prayers for and attendance at his or her association meeting. It is the great Bible truth "And they shall be all taught of God."

Prayer for each year's meeting is enhanced by a student's knowing that the association is already the result of prayer—of Mary Baker Eddy's own prayers to safeguard her discovery of Christian Science and to aid her followers everywhere and for all time to come in their demonstration of that discovery. We find answers to her prayers recorded in her Manual of The Mother Church. She once said of the Manual By-Laws that "each one was the fruit of experience and the result of prayer." ²

Just think of it: each Christian Science Students Association meeting, held in obedience to Articles XXVI and XXVII of the *Manual*, is the result of Mrs. Eddy's own prayers. And in a very real sense God is still answering those prayers! For God's provision, as revealed to our Leader, is still in effect. By our prayers for and attendance at our associations, we're having part in God's answer. Recognition of this fact confirms the healing and redeeming purpose of each year's meeting.

An association meeting is fundamentally religious in purpose, sentiment, and conduct. What rightly impels students to attend their associations isn't ritualistic habit, superstition, or mere personal or sentimental attachment. The genuine motive power for all right activity, individual and collective, is God Himself. Divine love is the real drawing power of an association meeting.

Pupils come together annually for a sacred purpose—to learn better how to worship the One who has brought them together. To glorify Him more fully by bearing greater witness to His goodness, power, and love in their lives. In this

way they're able to learn more about themselves as the man of God's creating, His perfect reflection and expression.

The best way any of us can show proper love and gratitude for God's provision of Primary class teaching is to show loyalty to the Leader who, in obedience to divine direction, established the office of authorized teacher of Christian Science and that of class-taught pupil. It's to show reverence for the Master, Christ Jesus—a reverence that was never absent from Mrs. Eddy, either before or after her discovery. It's to show the same devotion to God that our Master taught his disciples and lived so supremely himself. This unbroken chain of love links us to God—the source of all true love—and unites us with all those who love God. With all those.

In this union of faithful love, neither time nor space can undo the divine purpose evident in Primary class instruction. An active love for God, having rightly brought pupil and teacher together in the first place, is what properly keeps them together in steadfast loyalty to Truth. Neither life nor death can annul the law of right attraction, which is also the law of divine continuity.

An association of students whose teacher is no longer present is not without the one Mind to guide it. When we detach the mortal notions of beginning and ending, coming and going, from our concept of what an association meeting represents, we'll be able to reap the benefits of more than just a single day's talk.

Whether the person conducting the meeting is the teacher or a guest speaker, students can find emerging from the meeting a continuity of spiritual good. A continuity of purpose. A continuity of inspiration and dedication. A continuity of teaching that brings out in new and fresh ways the infinite dimensions of divinity already revealed in the Bible and Mrs. Eddy's writings.

These textbooks of Christian Science consti-

tute an impersonal and universal standard for the accurate impartation of scientific knowledge at every association meeting around the world. Although this standard is exact in its statement of Science, it allows for infinite variation of theme. Individuality of expression and understanding isn't sacrificed by being conformed to Truth. Truth reveals itself in unfoldment that is eternally fresh, never stale or redundant. That's why every expression of Truth must be original in both eloquence and comprehension.

piritual sense, in an act of true memory, views existence in terms of what is, not what was. This immortal sense called memory—in other words, this continuous understanding of things immortal—expresses the immediacy of all-knowing Mind.

Each Christian Science Students Association fulfills in a vital way the office of the promised Comforter, "the Spirit of truth," which Jesus said "shall teach you all things, and bring all things to your remembrance, whatsoever I have said unto you." ³ An association meeting testifies to the spiritual fact that true memory is immortal. Each of us as the child of God, the expression of omniscience, possesses only one Mind—the Mind of Christ, which never forgets but always knows.

Immortal memory, unlike human memory, so-called, is an act of spiritual sense bearing witness to the continuity of God's wisdom and intelligence in man. Rightly understood, genuine memory isn't a faculty of the brain recalling past knowledge gained through accretion over many days gone by. In fact, memory as God bestows it has nothing to do with a mortal past. It doesn't look back with nostalgia or sorrow to a supposed time of greater good than now. Such a backward view of existence is retrogressive and harmful, as Lot's poor wife found out—much to her saline regret!

Spiritual perception, on the other hand—or absolutely speaking, on the only hand—is restorative and progressive. It gives us beauty for ashes. It restores the years that the locusts are

supposed to have eaten. It sees all existence in the present tense and therefore always in current view.

The Comforter, bringing all things to our remembrance, identifies the good we've associated with the past as an eternally present fact of creation. Spiritual sense, in an act of true memory, views existence in terms of what is, not what was. This immortal sense called memory—in other words, this continuous understanding of things immortal—expresses the immediacy of all-knowing Mind.

What is called the human, mortal mind is a counterfeit of the divine Mind. The mind of mortals is basically sequential in nature. If it looks to the north, it must first turn from viewing the south. To start adding in arithmetic, it needs to stop subtracting. No matter how it measures time—in seconds or centuries, annually or millennially—this false, finite mentality is both limited and limiting in scope, and it must yield, through spiritual regeneration, to the one, eternal Mind.

Divine consciousness is infinite in nature. Its thoughts are simultaneous; it knows all things, and does all things, in the same eternal moment. The Mind that is omniscient Spirit doesn't stop knowing you (as it's idea) in order to know me. And it most certainly hasn't stopped knowing, loving, and maintaining the true idea, or identity, of those that human sight can no longer see. The one Mind encompasses us all—all those that the sequentially limiting mind of mortals reckons to be in either the past, the present, or the future.

According to eternal sense, all identity and all understanding of ail identity are current—never prior or subsequent to right now. Hence never forgotten or unknown. This is genuine memory as God causes it to be, and it's something we each can possess and express. The Bible puts it this way: "That which hath been is now; and that which is to be hath already been; and God requireth that which is past." 4

Everything good in what we call the past, God requires for His present completeness and perfection. The passage of time has no power to take from us what God permanently bestows on His creation. Loss of intelligence, labeled as forgetfulness or insanity; loss of love and happiness, cloaked as grief or enmity; loss of health, diagnosed as disease; loss of usefulness, classi-

fied as unemployment—such losses are, according to spiritual sense, nonhappenings, having no actual occurrence or validity in the infinite realm of God.

When heaven is found to be here on earth—at hand and within us, as Jesus taught and demonstrated by healing others—the notion that anything good in our lives has ever been lost (and that therefore something bad has occurred in its place) will disappear from our experience, leaving no trace of anything untoward as having ever really happened. Such correction is similar to the way a water-mirage in the desert vanishes before our sight when we gain a better perception of things. In its "going" the mirage leaves behind no trace of wetness on the spot where water never really was.

The good that sequential thinking ignorantly disposes of as something past and gone has in reality never been relinquished by God and therefore has never been lost to His reflection, man. True memory, or eternal spiritual sense, is always capable of seeing and demonstrating what still is.

What took place when two of Jesus' followers journeyed to Emmaus after the Master's crucifixion and resurrection is an example of immortal memory brought to light, of God's requiring "that which is past" to be brought to remembrance, to present understanding. Mrs. Eddy explains: "In the walk to Emmaus, Jesus was known to his friends by the words, which made their hearts burn within them, and by the breaking of bread. The divine Spirit, which identified Jesus thus centuries ago, has spoken through the inspired Word and will speak through it in every age and clime. It is revealed to the receptive heart, and is again seen casting out evil and healing the sick." 5

In a special sense, attending an association meeting can represent each pupil's individual journey to Emmaus. The truths voiced at the meeting evidence the fact that the divine Spirit is speaking to each of us through the inspired Word. The Christ, Comforter, in bringing all things to our remembrance, ensures that not a single truth can ever really be lost or forgotten by us. In the life of every student of Christian Science, none of Jesus' words of truth, none of Mrs. Eddy's, none of a teacher's or guest speaker's, will pass away until all be fulfilled.

And, yes, our hearts in coming to know Christ, Truth, more fully will burn within us, with a celestial fire that can never be put out. The joy and fresh promise that we felt on the first day of class instruction are forever ours to feel again and again and again. And the dedication and loyalty to God and to His Cause, Christian Science, that we felt on the last day of class are equally ours today and forever. The good that God impels in us He sustains in us.

The resurrective Christ within consciousness can never be extinguished. It glows within us and shines through us. This champion against humdrum living lifts mankind above the dead level of monotony, ritualism, passivity. What burns within us keeps us alive, awake, and on fire with goodness!

Christian Scientists who daily dwell on the things of divine Spirit, and who strive to abide by them throughout the day, can never grow blase about the truth of spiritual being, and consequently cannot grow listless or helpless in life. Their first love stays first. They daily perceive the "new tongue" with new eyes and new ears—with eyes that haven't grown accustomed to the "same old words," and with ears that haven't "heard it all before." For them the beauty of holiness never loses its luster.

As we express that Mind which was also in Christ Jesus, we're able to pray daily, read our Bible Lessons,⁶ attend our church services—all in a spirit of newness and wonder. Clearly, our church services, lectures, and association meetings need our inspired attentiveness as well as our faithful attendance. Spiritual sense, like the mercies of God, is new every morning.

As loyal Christian Scientists, we can trust God's Comforter, divine Science, to bring all things to our perpetual remembrance. The Bible says of God, "He hath made his wonderful works to be remembered." A Christian Science Students Association meeting is meant for just such remembering. It testifies to the eternal fact that the continuous glory of Truth and Love is unforgettable.

- 1 Upon election, Chairman presides at first meeting of new Executive Committee (following the Association Day address) <u>and all subsequent meetings.</u> Former Chairman's notebook is turned over to new Chairman.
- 2 Both Chairman and Secretary sign all Association checks, as two signatures are required.
- 3 New nominees for Executive Committee: Chairman phones the 6 nominees chosen by the Committee to see if they are willing and able to stand for election for a 3-year term of service on the Committee, which would begin on the next year's Association Day. (It might be well to alert them that the first meeting may last until 7 or 7:30 PM if plane or dinner arrangements need to be considered.)

If any of the original 3 nominees for the men decline, Chairman then proceeds as necessary to call a man alternate, but only until we have 3 men who have accepted. The same procedure is followed with the women, calling the original 3 women nominees first, and only calling a woman alternate if a woman has declined. We will then have a slate of 3 men and 3 women to submit to the membership for election to the Executive Committee.

- 4 <u>Possible Future Guest Speakers</u>: Chairman phones those individuals voted on by the Committee to see if they would be interested in addressing our Association for specified future dates. If so, we would send them our regular interview questions and would welcome their in-depth response for our review.
- 5. Chairman prepares Executive Committee Report to be read on Association Day. Secretary will assist.
- 6. Letter prepared by Letter Writing Committee to accompany annual contribution to The Mother Church is submitted to the Chairman for approval.
- 7. If speaker is arriving by plane, Chairman meets her/him at airport and delivers her/him to hotel on Friday and perhaps returns to airport Sunday morning.
- 8. Chairman escorts speaker from the hotel to our Friday 4 PM preparation meeting in the Sunday School room of First Church. Arrangement of furniture and checking of sound equipment will be arranged to speaker's satisfaction. Familiarize speaker with layout of church and escort <u>back</u> to the hotel
- 9. Association Day: Chairman serves as escort to speaker throughout the day to the church about 8:45 AM; takes speaker and spouse to lunch if that is agreeable to them or perhaps back to hotel (depending on lunch arrangements); returning to church around 1:30 PM; back to hotel at close of address unless Chairman is continuing his service on the Executive Committee meeting, in which case someone else will be asked to do it). All of this usually gets worked out after learning speaker's wishes regarding meal arrangements.

(Chairman presides over the Association business meeting at 9:30 AM, introduces speaker, closes morning session with collection and afternoon session with thanks to speaker, distribution of summaries. Then Hymn 264 - and farewell to Association. All of this will be more clearly outlined in the Orders of the Day for that year.

- 10. Chairman, if continuing service on the Committee, attends Executive Committee meeting immediately following association address. Election for Chairman for new fiscal year takes place.
- 11. Chairman (and spouse) serve as Association hosts and take speaker (and spouse) to dinner at a good restaurant on Saturday night, if that fits in with the speaker's plans. It would also be after the Executive Committee meeting, if Chairman is continuing service on the Committee.
- 12. All expenses -- long distance phone calls, airport parking and mileage, lunch and/or dinner with speaker (and spouse if accompanying), etc.,etc., -- with receipts when possible -- should be given to the secretary for reimbursement.
- 13. Other duties may surface closer to the time -- after we work out the details with the speaker.

Recommended Executive Committee Procedures (2-F) The Christian Science Students' Association of the Pupils of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B.

The Executive Committee works as a unit to conduct the business affairs of the Association. Communication is done by phone, email, surface mail, and an in-person Association Day November Annual Executive Committee Business meeting.

(All Association materials and discussion are confidential to the Executive Committee.)

November Executive Committee Annual Business Meeting: The Executive Committee meets right after the Association Day address downstairs in the Sunday School. The agenda for the meeting will be sent out the month before the meeting is held. Committee members will bring their Working Paper Notebooks to the meeting. The New Electronic Notebook will hold all history and instructions coming from Loretta and Mr. Bowles, plus other Templates to help simplify the assignments. Executive Committee business will be conducted through phone conference calls and emails throughout the year to discuss various issues. (Please put "Bowles" in the subject line of emails, for helpful filing and easy identification.)

In General: The Executive Committee Members are the Fiduciaries or Guardians of the Association's administrative functions. These include:

- spiritual daily work and prayerful support for the Association
- fiscal responsibilities (intelligent oversight and financial understanding of the Association's financial assets)
- careful, insightful leadership, direction, and selection of and for such Association committees and responsibilities as:
 - * Selection of Association Day Speakers
 - * Financial Review Committee
 - * Letter Writing Committee

Our Foundation: All responsibilities and committee work should be done with a sense of orderliness, promptness, and Principle. It is joyous activity and should bring uplift, inspiration, and progress. The committee is not a group of individuals but is a team expressing one Mind, Principle, Love - using the Golden Rule as its guide. In the spirit of the Golden Rule it is expected that committee members will respond to a call, email or action request within 4 days, after that time the committee will move forward based on the majority of those who have responded.

ARTICLE VI-RULES OF PROCEDURE*

Section 1. When operating under the management of the Executive Committee, the rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order" shall govern all meetings of this association when they are not inconsistent with these bylaws.

Your teacher cannot foresee a time or a situation when it would be desirable to amend these bylaws. A democratic and businesslike way of conducting the affairs of this association is provided for in these bylaws. If members will keep human will out of the way and realize that the only purpose of this association is to provide spiritual growth for them, business sessions will always be held to a minimum of time, about thirty minutes, and harmony will characterize their meetings.

Remember, you are always peacemakers.

(Computer -- double click on Documents, then Claris Works, then Exec Comm, then Fin'l Report.)
- 2. Employer's Quarterly Federal Tax return Form 941-IRS and check to cover.

May 1. Check supplies.

June
1. Contact Clerk of First Church, Atlanta, reconfirming use of church for current year's preparation and association dates — and establishing date for next succeeding year. AFTER ASSOCIATION MEETING

Saturday night and over week-end: Secretary and another member will re-check contributions against count given by Counting Committee. Their count is done so hurriedly that tally needs recounting. Also, additional checks are often given to Secretary, and these must be included. When reconciliation is completed, all checks are put in alphabetical order and are stamped on back "For deposit only - NHB Assn". Then deposit slips are prepared, listing the checks alphabetically by name and giving amount. A separate deposit slip is prepared for cash only -- and our account number should be put on all cash strip dividers before depositing. Only bills of same denomination should be strapped together.

Monday - Deposit all contributions promptly.

Get letters and checks off to The Mother Church (letter prepared by the Letter Writing Committee), First Church, Atlanta, (include janitor's check also and refer to it). Checks will be in amounts approved at Executive Committee meeting.

As soon as possible:

- 1 Check card files from Association Day against previous year's cards both for attendance and changes of address. Keep non-attendees cards separate temporarily as we send them a special letter. (See #3). If address changes occur, mark changes on master list, attendance cards (both sessions) and enter in computer. (Click on "Documents", then Claris files, then "Assn Mbrs" data base, then "Layout", then "Find", then type in last name on proper line, then "All". Individual's data base will show up. Type in current year on "Last Assn" line for those who attended and new address or other information on proper lines.) After all address changes are completed, pull up from computer 2 new hard copies of master list 1 for Chairman I for office.
- 2. Check off with check mark (\checkmark) on master sheet those who attended the afternoon session to show that they received their summaries. Mark with dash (-) those who advised us they would be attending another association meeting instead of ours. Mark with asterisk (*) those to whom summary or references were mailed (after receiving request for same and confirmation that they did <u>not</u> attend any other association during the current year).

- 3. Write letter to non-attendees, letting them know we missed them and who our speaker will be for the next year; also identify the new Executive Committee members. If a summary or references are available, let them know they may have a copy if they write us requesting it and confirm that they have not attended another association nor do they plan to do so for the current year. Count the non-attendee cards after separating them from the new cards turned in by current year's attendees. This will be the number of copies you will need for the non-attendee mailing. Add 3 or 4 to that number for extras. Prepare the mailing labels for that group and affix to envelopes. After the mailing labels are completed, file the non-attendee cards alphabetically in the file boxes with the new current cards.
- 4. Make cards for first time visitors and file in brown wooden card index file in supply cabinet. Mark current association date attendance for both first time and former visitors on their individual cards. Also mark any other pertinent info such as visitor's teacher, thank-you notes received, etc
- 5. Add names of those who served on Letter Writing Committee in current year to the list of those who have already served in that capacity. If any former out-of-town members move to Atlanta, add their names to the list of locals who have not served. We are now asking some who have previously served to serve again.
- 6. Prepare minutes of Executive Committee meeting which followed the association address and send copies to all Executive Committee members. Complete all assignments from that meeting. All correspondence to Executive Committee members should be punched with standard 3-holes so that all items may be inserted in their special notebooks.

AUDIT

Executive Committee appoints 3 members of the association to serve on the Audit Committee in order to obtain a prompt review of the association records for the fiscal year just ended. Karin Smith, CPA, is permanent chair of this Committee. Don Dietrichs and Jim Prather are the other members of the Committee.

COMPUTER ACCOUNTING - QUICKEN PROGRAM

Write computer checks as due for rent, salary, payroll taxes and other expenses. Click "Record" after writing each check or entering each deposit. This automatically records the transaction in the register, along with its category. Checks require two signatures -

Executive Committee Chairman and Secretary-Treasurer. Each month balance bank statement with computer check register, and pull up the following "Business" reports from Quicken -- Balance Sheet, Transaction Detail for current month, Income Statement for current month, and Income Statement for year to date (fiscal year). File in 3-hole notebook. These records are given to Audit Committee for review, together with all other financial records, at end of fiscal year.

Keep records and receipts for petty cash expenditures.

Paid bills are filed near back of top drawer of file cabinet.

Prepare Employer's Quarterly Tax Return Form 941 each quarter when form is received, and write check to cover tax due.

Prepare IRS forms 1099 & 1096 (speaker's fee and office rent) and W-2 & W-3 (secretary's salary). These are due annually - before January 31.

Prepare special format financial statements for Executive Committee for first six months of fiscal year (October through March) -- (in Claris Files under "Exec Comm", Fin'l Report") and annually (October 1 through September 30) for Association meeting and Executive Committee (in Claris Files under "Assn Day", "1-Fin'l Statement and 2-Fin'l Statement").

If a check comes in designating both dues and contribution, split to include both categories when deposit is entered in computer.

CORRESPONDENCE

Use association letterhead for all association business. Make file copies on plain white paper.

DECEASED OR WITHDRAWING MEMBERS

- 1 Remove cards from both "morning" and "afternoon" card files. Mark "deceased" with date also mark date that The Mother Church was notified from this office -- or "withdrawn" as the case may be.
- 2 Remove individual file folder from files. Retain class application only. Destroy other correspondence.

- 3 Before clearing name from computer records, transfer **dues paid info** to their individual sheet in the Dues Book. (This book has payment records through 1994. Later payments were entered into computer.) Then remove that sheet from the book and file it and one card from current card file box with the application alphabetically in the file drawer marked "Inactive, deceased, withdrawn". Latest address should be retained.
- 4 Second card from current card file box goes in little grey file box marked "deceased or withdrawn" in low wood supply cabinet.
- 5 Cross off name on master list mark "deceased" or "withdrawn" and date.
- 6 Clear record from computer.
- 7 Notify The Mother Church when any member of the Association passes on.
- 8 Send letter of sympathy to surviving spouse or children.

DUES

When dues come in, stamp checks on back "for deposit only" with association name. On deposit slip, list names of payees alphabetically and enter amounts. Make one carbon for our file. Original goes to bank with deposit. From our file copy post to the member's dues record in computer (Claris Files "Assn Mbrs") the amount and date deposited -- same with contributions that come in the mail, but identify those amounts on deposit slip as contributions and enter in separate category in computer. Place check mark after each individual's name on deposit slip when amount paid is posted in computer. Also enter total amount of deposit in Quicken and place check mark at total on deposit slip to show it's been entered in computer.

Keep running total of number of members paying dues on separate sheet of paper, adding the count each time a deposit of dues is made.

DUES REMINDER MAILING - should be mailed early in January. Includes

- 1 Cover letter (the **first paragraph** of which requests payment of dues)
- 2 Sheraton Colony Square reservation sheet
- 3 Ballot for electing new Executive Committee members
- 4 Return envelope marked "Ballot"
- 5 Admission cards (morning and afternoon) for next association meeting separate colors
 - 6 Study assignment

All of the foregoing requires "plan ahead" preparation.

- 1 Cover letter should include all pertinent information and explanation of enclosures. Should be prepared for approval by Executive Committee at October meeting. They may wish to add or change certain points. It will include information regarding our next speaker and hopefully his/her study assignment. Get count of current number of members from computer listing (Claris Files "Assn Mbrs") plus a few extras before having duplicated.
- 2 <u>Sheraton Colony Square Hotel</u> reservation sheets -- See file folder for Colony Square and Monthly Calendar of Secretarial Duties. Angelia Townsend (404-733-6943) is our contact. They give us a special rate and set aside a certain number of rooms for us, subject to negotiation. They also provide us with a complimentary room for our speaker and spouse if at least 50 rooms are used. Request 275 reservation sheets to send to our out-of-town members (only one to a couple, enclosed in wife's envelope) and visitors..
- 3, 4 <u>Ballot and ballot-envelope</u> must be prepared and duplicated. Copy USA has our ballot-envelope printed for us, but Kinko's does everything else. They will not do envelopes.
- 5 <u>Admission cards</u> different colors for morning and afternoon (also different from previous year). They are printed on **postcard stock**, 4 cards to a sheet, which requires 4 cuts. **Take sample along so they are cut to fit our card files NOT postcard size. Date for next meeting has to be inserted before printing**
- 6 <u>Study Assignment</u> If speaker is unable to give us the assignment early enough to include in this mailing, we may have to send it out as a separate mailing in June or whenever.
- 7 If need stamped envelopes, order one box (500) #10 regular letter size envelopes from the post office stamped and printed with our return address and "Address Correction Requested". Takes six weeks. A new order form is enclosed with each box received and can be found with the supply we have on hand.
- 8 Make a set of mailing labels on computer. Be sure the list is up-fo-date with all address changes.
- 9 After all copies of each enclosure are on hand -- and printed address labels have been placed on envelopes -- collate, fold, stuff and seal -- ready to mail. Weigh for proper postage. Those envelopes which include the hotel reservation may require additional postage.

<u>FILING</u> - should be done promptly. Study and review the file drawers so you are familiar with the proper identification of folders -- and where different subjects should be filed.

<u>TAXES</u> - IRS Form 941 (Employer's Quarterly Tax Return) must be filed in April, July, October and January to record and pay withheld FICA (Social Security/Medicare) and withheld income taxes, together with Employer's share of taxes on same.

IRS Forms 1099 and 1096 and W-2 and W-3 are due annually before January 31.

<u>VISITORS</u> - When a request to visit on Association Day is received, first determine from visitors' box (brown card index box in low supply cabinet) or computer (Claris Files "Visitors DB") whether he/she has visited before. If so, send an invitation letter (copy in computer - Claris Files "Visitors"). If the request comes from someone who has never visited us before, ask for a letter from their Association secretary, giving us permission to invite them. After this is received, send them an invitation letter. If their Association has disbanded, be sure to get the name and location of the Association. Include in **all** our invitation letters a visitor's tag and copy of our study assignment if they are local residents: if out-of-town, also enclose a reservation sheet for the Sheraton Colony Square, which they might find convenient. If the request is for husband and wife, enclose 2 visitor's tags, 2 study assignment sheets, and one **unstamped envelope** addressed to the spouse as his/her entry authorization. The stamped envelope in which you enclosed all of the above is the card of admission for the other one. Weigh it so that the correct postage is applied.

Just before association day, prepare list of expected visitors. Make 4 copies, two for our files, one for Membership Chairman and one for the table at the entry door. Advise General Arrangements Chairman the number of visitors expected.

Do not deposit visitor checks until after Association Day. If they did not attend, return checks.

Make a computer record (Claris Files "Visitors DB") for each new person attending with date attended, address, teacher's name, association disbanded, names given as reference, etc. Also make a card with this same information to put in brown card index box (in low supply cabinet). Mark cards and also enter in computer the current attendance date for those who have attended previously. Also put list of visitors for current year in file folder in association file drawer.

Secretary-Treasurer Performance Review The Christian Science Students' Association of the Pupils of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B. November 4, 2017

When I started to list some of Sandi's strengths and skills as the Secretary-Treasurer of our Association, the thing that stood out to me was the love she expresses! Love for God and church, love for our Association and all of its members, love for the Executive Committee members. Added to that are her dedication to Christian Science, her faith in God's government of the Association, and her sense of humor. She is our "corporate memory," helping newer Executive Committee members (like me) know what as been done before and coordinating all of the activities of our Association during the year and especially on Association day. Some other qualities mentioned by members of the Exec. Comm. include her honesty and trustworthiness, her care and concern for others, her willingness to go the extra mile to get things done, her dependability, her ability to work with different Association members and committees with various styles of management over the years. And she does it all with a smile.

Of course, in any organization there are things that could be improved. A big challenge that came up for Sandi and the Exec. Comm. this year was Sandi's lack of confidence in using technology. To some extent this is due to a lack of training. She had been relying on her husband to bridge the gaps in her computer skills, and when he was no longer available, Sandi herself recognized the need and came up with a reasonable solution. Some committee members felt that she should have asked us before she hired (initially with her own money) a CPA to help her with financial record keeping, but eventually we all agreed that the technological aspect of the Secretary-Treasurer's job has greatly increased over the years and having someone else assist with some of that turned out to be an acceptable solution, at least for the time being. I would also encourage Sandi to be open to working with new technology and to recognize that confidence and careful accuracy are as important in the digital world as they are in metaphysics.

The other two areas where our Association needs improvement fall under the headings of communication and our chain of command. For both of these, the Secretary-Treasurer is interacting with the Exec. Comm. and its chairman, and all of us need to be better!

Sandi should remember that we want (and need) information, but not human opinions. And officially, requests for action should generally be addressed to the chairman, rather than to the entire Exec. Comm. Of course, this assumes that the chairman follows through, communicates to the committee and then responds to the Sec.-Treas. in a timely way. When I lost track of some of my duties, I was grateful to receive Sandi's reminders, and the committee sometimes needed a little prodding, too.

It falls to Sandi to be sure that the rest of us do our jobs, and the notebooks developed by previous Exec. Comm. members are a big help, but keeping them up-to-date has been a challenge. This year we began the process of digitizing these books, which will mean that the Sec.-Treas. and the Exec. Comm. should all have the same templates and lists, but the Sec.-Treas.'s accuracy will be paramount in maintaining the new approach.

With regard to the chain of command in our Association, I think all of us need to be aware of our own duties and how they fit with the duties of others. For example, last January both Sandi and I failed to seek the Exec. Comm.'s approval before sending out the January letter to the Association. In my inexperience, I needed and appreciated Sandi's guidance, while committee members with more knowledge of our Association 's history and Mr. Bowles' guidance would prefer less advice.

Overall, I have certainly appreciated all that Sandi does to keep our Association on track humanly and metaphysically. I am grateful for her big heart and generous service!

In an October, 2018, conference call, the Executive Committee easily listed many of Sandra Murray's good qualities: She is a "people person," in touch with many Association members and reaching out to help when she becomes aware of a need. She is a resource for members and for the Executive Committee, providing continuity and a knowledge of recent Association history. She is a great example of what it means to be a <u>student</u> of C. S.—continuing to learn and grow spiritually and supporting our Association and its activities metaphysically!

Last year, Sandi initiated improvements in the handling of our financial data, and that effort has continued this year. We have now moved from having an outside C.P.A. help with bookkeeping tasks to developing an internal position of Assistant Treasurer to assist Sandi, and Sandi is learning what information she needs to communicate to the assistant in order to keep the Association's financial records upto-date & accurate. During this process we became aware of some issues in our employment tax payments and reporting. Sandi helped to identify the forms that have been filed with the IRS for the past few years, but some data needed to be recreated, because copies of some reports had not been retained. Sandi now knows to keep copies of everything we send to the IRS.

The Exec. Comm. and Financial Review Committee should continue to work with Sandi to clarify which financial responsibilities will continue to be done by the Sec.-Treas. and which will be shifted to the assistant treasurer. Investment Policy Statement

Objective: The goal of this account is to produce a total return per year 2% greater than the inflation rate, stressing principal preservation and income. In order to achieve the desired objectives and allow potential

for growth, the following asset mix will be used and shall adhere to the following guidelines- 70% bonds, and 30% equities. Such asset allocation shall be adhered to unless changed in writing. All investments will adhere to the guidelines set forth below. The investment time horizon for monitoring and evaluation purposes shall be five years. Interim evaluation shall

occur at least quarterly.

Income:

The purpose of this segment is to provide income and to reduce the volatility of the overall portfolio. Further, since interest rates cannot be forecast, this segment of the portfolio should be established and maintained in a "laddered" fashion as described below. The type investment shall adhere to the requirements set forth below, unless changed in writing. Neil H. Bowles Investment Policy Statement:

Portfolio Investment Strategy Guidelines:

(The objective of the Investment Policy is to preserve capital to serve the cause of Christian Science and to provide resources to cover deficiencies in the operating funds of the Association, if the membership dues and collections become insufficient to cover the costs.)*

Objective: The goal of this account is to produce a total return per year 2% greater than the inflation rate, stressing principal preservation and income.

Asset Allocation:

In order to achieve the desired objectives and allow potential for growth, the following guidelines for the asset mix will be -70% Bonds, 30% Equities. Such asset allocation shall be adhered to unless changed in writing which is approved by the Executive Committee. The investment time horizon for monitoring and evaluation purposes shall be 5 years.

1. Income (Bonds):

The purpose of this segment is to provide income and to reduce the volatility of the overall portfolio. Further, since interest rates cannot be forecast, this segment of the portfolio should be established and maintained in a "laddered" fashion. This portfolio shall strive to produce a real rate of return by spacing maturities so that maturities occur on a regular basis, allowing the proceeds to be reinvested at the longest acceptable maturity. All interest not paid out shall be used to purchase additional debt obligations, except as directed.

Restrictions: Fixed-income sector of portfolio

- 1. Maturities shall not exceed 15 years. (minimum exceptions)*
- 2. No more than 20% shall be placed in any one issue, and no more than 30% in any one issuer, with the exception of obligations of the U.S. Government or its Agencies.
- 3. The following debt obligations are allowed:
 - -Money Market Funds
 - -Certificates of Deposit at insured institutions
 - -Direct obligations of the U.S. Government or its Agencies
- 4. All fixed income securities shall be rated "AA"* or better, or the equivalent by a major bond rating service.

2. Growth (Equities):

The growth portion of this portfolio shall consist of the common stocks of U.S. corporations, convertible bonds of U.S. corporations and, convertible preferred shares of U.S. corporations. The market capitalization of any investment shall be a minimum of \$50 million dollars. Further, there shall be at least 3 million common shares outstanding, since liquidity is a prime consideration. The 30% equity portion shall be invested for growth. However, 10% of the equity portion shall be exempt from these restrictions.

Restrictions:

Preferred* no debt or stock in any company which produces, sells, distributes or services pharmaceuticals, alcohol, tobacco, firearms, gambling, health care or soft drinks and their bottlers.



Follow-up to our discussion about the cash received from the Mother Church with regards to the Trust.

In October 1958 Mr. Bowles set up a Chartable Trust with the Mother Church. This called for the net income to be paid quarterly. The distributions will continue until there are less than 10 members or the association is disbanded.

March 1984 Mr. Bowles made an amendment to the Chartable Trust so the entire trust value is given to the endowment of The Christian Science Monitor instead of the General Fund of the Mother Church.

It is the Mother Churches policy to have a balanced approach to the trust. Part is in equities for growth, and part is in fixed income to create the income that is distributed to the association. They put 70% in equities and 30% in fixed income.

The \$8,549 reported to the association is the total distribution for 2007. Since the year has not ended they project the final payment and included it in \$8,549. The final quarterly payment could be different because market situations in the fourth quarter may vary. So, of the total investment \$352,729.27 the fixed income value is \$102,525.25, the distribution represents an 8.34% return. That is much better than I thought.





Neil H. Bowles Bequest History 2015 (4-H) The Christian Science Students' Association of The Pupils of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B.

A bequest from the Estate of Helen Miller of \$698,950 was received in the spring of 2015. The Association's Executive Committee discussed the usage of the funds and desired to follow the intended interests of Mr. and Mrs. Miller, the donors. To that end, a discussion was held with Helen Miller's close friends, as to what Helen may have wanted and where her interests were. Out of that conversation it was determined that benefiting the care facilities was very aligned with Helen's interests and also support for The Christian Science Monitor.

The Executive Committee also did not feel comfortable establishing "hard and fast rules" about usage of the funds, but instead decided that Helen would have endorsed the first year allocation of a portion of the funds totaling \$100,000 to support The Christian Science Monitor (\$30,000); renovation at Chestnut Hill Benevolent Association (\$30,000); gifts of \$10,000 each to Peace Haven and Glenmont; and up to \$20,000 for a "fellowship fund" to provide financial assistance to members where that support might encourage attendance at our Association Meeting.

The committee felt that the balance of the funds (approximately \$600,000) when invested, could likely enable subsequent Executive Committee's to make allocations of \$30,000 or more to The Christian Science Monitor and other care facilities...to be determined each year by that Executive Committee.

As for the management of the funds, the sense was that Jim Keel would invest them in a separate account and would use the same prudent investing that Mr. Bowles would have endorsed except that in lieu of fixed income investments, we would endorse the conservative investment of these funds in social accountability securities or indexed mutual funds (all of which would exclude investments in medical, alcohol, tobacco, military etc.). It would be logical that the Executive Committee would receive regular financial statements of the investment accounts from Mr. Keel at Morgan Stanley and, based on those statements, would be able to make appropriate annual allocations.

Specifics of initial investment of this bequest: After making initial gifts totaling \$80,000 and reserving \$20,000 as an assistance fund for Association members (which was deposited in the Association's primary account), the remaining \$600,000 was initially invested in three Morgan-Stanley accounts:

\$350,000 in account #229, \$200,000 in account #007 \$50,000 in account #171.

Within a year, these three "bequest" accounts were essentially consolidated into one (#007), because only one money manager was willing to filter investments according to our restrictions. The transition was carried out slowly and finally completed in October, 2018.

The Executive Committee minutes of June 29, 2015, also contain the following regarding dissolution of the Association and future use of these funds: "In the event of disbanding of the association, the Executive Committee at that time would be encouraged to distribute the balance of this "bequest fund" to The Monitor, to care facilities (that they would determine at that time); or to the Mother Church. Future Association Executive Committees would have the freedom to manage the Bequest Fund as they deemed appropriate and/or to consider alternate investment and spend strategies in coordination with the investment advisor."

Qualifications for Prospective Guest Speakers (7-B) The Christian Science Students' Association of The Pupils of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B.

"Article III, Section 3. Duties of Executive Committee: They shall carefully inquire into the qualifications of available addressers for the association meetings and shall elect yearly one, well qualified, to address the association. Satisfactory addressers may be invited again for other years, but only one year at a time." *

Notes For The Executive Committee From Neil H. Bowles July 28, 1982:

1. No one is to address the Association at any time who has in his or her background the false teaching (promoted by the Bliss Knapp group) that Mrs. Eddy is the woman of the Apocalypse. The Archives have the following statement written by Mrs. Eddy in 1896: "It (referring to that false concept) has no more validity than to fancy a statue of Liberty represented by a woman resembling some individual's form or face, then name it that individual." Mrs. Eddy's statement has also been quoted verbally in Normal Class by Richard J. Davis as "I am no more the woman of the Apocalypse than the Stature of Liberty is liberty." Mr. Bowles' Normal Class teacher was Richard Davis, who was taught by Bicknell Young, who was taught by Mr. Kimball. (The Cobb students have had the incorrect teaching.)

Notes For The Executive Committee From Neil H. Bowles August 23, 1982:

2. In selecting a speaker to address the Association, great care should be exercised in inquiring into qualifications of the prospective speaker. They should have had considerable experience in the practice work, and often one of the lecturers would be a good candidate for consideration. However, there again, care should be taken to learn the background of their teaching. As my pupils know, my teachers in Christian Science, Primary and Normal classes were Professor Hermann S. Hering and Richard J. Davis.

Guidelines for Christian Science Students Associations from The Christian Science Board of Directors and Board of Education (March 1987):

4-1 Responsibility of executive committee to set standard for addresses:

When the teacher is no longer in charge of the association it becomes the responsibility of the executive committee to maintain a high standard for the one who addresses the association as guest speaker. The committee should take the initiative to specify the number of hours reserved for the address, and to satisfy itself that the guest speaker fully understands that the association looks forward to material that will contribute substantially to the spiritual growth of each member. The speaker is entitled to keen and appreciative support as he prepares the address, and assurance that the committee is doing everything possible to provide a harmonious and receptive atmosphere when the address is presented.

Manual By-Laws

"Without Teachers. Sect. 2. Those beloved brethren whose teacher has left them, can elect an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association."

(Church Manual, Article XXVII)

Supplementary Information for Associations without Teachers-Board of Education 2000

Selecting a Guest Speaker

Responsibility of executive committee and membership

It is the annual demonstration of each association without a teacher prayerfully to choose and invite the one who is to conduct the association meeting in accordance with the Manual, Article XXVII, Section 2.

Only pupils of loyal teachers may address an association and one so invited does not acquire any permanent standing relative to the association. The same speaker may be invited more than once.

Choosing the right person to address the annual association meeting each year is not just the responsibility of the executive committee. It is the demonstration of the entire association. In a very real sense the selection of the speaker expresses the association's thought about itself.

Good selection of the speaker begins by asking such questions as these:

- What is the purpose of our association meeting?
- Are we seeking that person, whether well-known or perhaps still undiscovered, who will best meet the need of our association on that special day?

Qualifications of an association speaker:

The qualities sought in an association speaker are spirituality, a sound understanding of Christian Science, the ability to demonstrate Christian Science, and the ability to communicate Christian Science. Individuals who have these qualities and are using them may be recognized by their:

effective healing work in the public practice;

- active in branch church work;
- articles published in the periodicals
- effective work as a lecturer, Committee on Publication , or in some other activity of The Mother Church

The association needs to have adequate information about the one to whom it is entrusting its annual address. For example:

- Is the prospective speaker free of private theories and interpretations of Mrs. Eddy's writings?
- Is he class taught by a loyal teacher?
- Is he in full support of all *Manual* provisions?
- Does he have substantial experience as a working, demonstrating Christian Scientist?
- Does he express himself clearly?

No two associations go about selecting a speaker in exactly the same way. Some associations defer extending an invitation to a speaker unless at least one member of the executive committee knows something, preferably firsthand, about him. Some require unanimous agreement among committee members before sending the invitation. Names of prospective speakers should be welcomed from members, but the committee properly accepts responsibility for obtaining more information about speakers and makes the final decision. It is not uncommon to interview by phone, or in person, the one who is being considered.

The Mother Church does not maintain a list of names nor does it recommend prospective speakers.

Association Address Criteria (7-E) The Christian Science Students' Association of The Pupils of Mr. Neil H. Bowles, C.S.B.

In a statement given by the Board of Directors of the Mother Church in 1954 (CSJ, Vol. 72, pps.149-150), the following concepts were shared about "Christian Science Class Teaching and Students' Associations:"

- "The purpose of class instruction is to so open the student's thought to the glory of God that the effulgence of Truth may pour in upon him, enlarging his demonstrable understanding of the allness of Spirit and the nothingness of matter, thereby establishing him in Christian Science....
- To keep the priceless experience of class instruction fresh and glowing in the student's thought Mrs. Eddy has provided for the associations of the pupils of loyal teachers to convene annually. (see Art. XXVI, Sect. 6). The annual meeting of his association is indeed a high light in the progress of the student; it is not a social event but is, as it were, an extension of class from year to year, made possible by the tender foresight of our Leader...
- When an association is left without the teacher, the members should carry on with renewed zeal and consecration, determined that through their untiring love and loyalty to Principle their association shall continue to fulfill in increasing degree the exalted purpose for which our Leader established it."

In "Guidelines for Christian Science Students Associations" from The Christian Science Board of Directors and Board of Education, March 1987 the following is stated:

* The Association Address

Every year the class-taught student meets with the fellow members of his Association to **renew and extend the inspiration of his Primary teaching**. In an **original** address prepared specifically for that event, the invited speaker provides further penetration into the Science of being **fresh**, **new insights**, showing how fundamental **spiritual truths are applicable to today's needs**. This includes, first of all, the needs of the individual, but also the needs of our church, and the needs of mankind.

The address is the main reason for bringing the members together each year, and it should occupy the major portion of the day. (Mr. Bowles did not recommend audience participation.)

* Responsibility of Executive Committee to set the Standard for Addresses

When the teacher is no longer in charge of the association it becomes the responsibility of the Executive Committee to maintain a high standard for the one who addresses the association as guest speaker. The committee should take the initiative to specify the number of hours reserved for the address, and to satisfy itself that the guest speaker fully understands that the association looks forward to material that will contribute substantially to the spiritual growth of each member.

The speaker is **entitled to keen and appreciative support** as he prepares the address, and assurance that the committee is doing everything possible to provide a harmonious and receptive atmosphere when the address is presented.

A Request for Background of Mr. Bowles and his teaching

Researched by Janet and Mike Long.

As to your questions about Mr. Bowles' teaching. Mr. and Mrs. Bowles were taught in Primary Class by Professor Hermann S. Hering. Mr. Hering was taught in Primary Class by Miss Ellen Elizabeth Cross in 1895, as was Mrs. Hering in an earlier class. At Mrs. Eddy's instructions Mr. Hering was taught by Edward A. Kimball in 1900 and in 1901 receiving the degree of C.S.B. (Mrs. Hering was taught both years as well receiving the same degree). Miss Cross was taught in Primary Class first by Miss Julia S. Bartlett and later was taught by Mrs. Eddy (Primary in November 1885, Normal in 1886, and the degree of C.S.D in 1888). Miss Bartlett, being one of Mrs. Eddy's earliest students who remained faithful to Mrs. Eddy all her life, was taught by Mrs. Eddy in 1880, 1882, 1884 (Normal Class) and 1887 (C.S.D. degree).

Mr. Hering, a Philadelphian, received his B.S. and M.E. degrees from the University of Pennsylvania in 1886, and later did special study in electrical engineering in London. He went to Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore and taught mathematics and electrical engineering for the 8 years prior to his going into the Christian Science practice. Mr. Hering read as Second Reader with Miss Cross at Second Church of Christ, Scientist, in Baltimore (1900-1902), and was also the Committee on Publication for Maryland and Washington, DC. Mrs. Eddy appointed Mr. Hering as the first three year term First Reader in the The Mother Church, (1902-1905) and while thus serving he read the services at the laying of the corner stone of The Mother Church extension.' "During this period he worked out an order for the Thanksgiving Day service, embodying points supplied by Mrs. Eddy who adopted it for use in all Christian Science Churches in 1903." He also served a three year term, at Mrs. Eddy's invitation, as First Reader of First Church of Christ, Scientist, Concord, New Hampshire. "There was a special significance to this move as our Leader was being sued by designing persons calling themselves 'Next Friends' who were endeavoring to have Mrs. Eddy adjudicated incompetent and thereby gain control of her person and her fortune. Daily during those trying days Mrs. Eddy drove to Professor Hering's home to confer with him and to instruct him how to work for her protection and the protection of the Cause. During several years Professor and Mrs. Hering were privileged and blessed by a very close association with our Leader. Mrs. Eddy had early heard of Professor Hering as he was given Primary class instruction by one of her pupils, and Mrs. Eddy was greatly pleased to learn of Professor Hering leaving his

professorship of mathematics and electrical engineering at Johns Hopkins University to devote his entire time to the practice of Christian Science." In 1905 he served as President of The Mother Church, and he served as Christian Science Lecturer for over thirty years, lecturing in many parts of the world.

Mr. Bowles' teacher in the Massachusetts Metaphysical College (Normal class) was Mr. Richard J. Davis of Chicago, in 1949. Mr. Davis was the first Christian Science Chaplain in the U. S. Navy. Mr. Davis served the Cause in many capacities including Editor of the Christian Science Periodicals and as a Christian Science Lecturer. Mr. Davis was taught in Normal class by Bicknell Young. Mr. Young was taught by Edward Kimball in both Primary class (1895) and Normal class (1901). Mr. Young also taught the Normal class himself in 1910 (selected by Mrs. Eddy on Mr. Kimball's praise of him) and again in 1937. Mr. Young from 1903 forward was a Christian Science Lecturer for many years, and First Reader of The Mother Church (1917-1920). Mr. Kimball was taught by Mrs. Eddy in 1888 and 1889 and later in 1898 receiving the degree of C.S.D. At this time he was also appointed to The Christian Science Board of Lectureship, and for the next nine years it is said "he possibly delivered over 1000 lectures as a Christian Science Lecturer." In 1899 he was one of the first teachers appointed to the newly formed Christian Science Board of Education and taught the Normal class in 1900, 1901, 1902, 1903, evidently in 1899, and perhaps later as well. He assisted in the 1901 revision of Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, and he proposed at the 1902 Annual Meeting that \$2,000,000 be raised to build The Mother Church extension.

Mr. Bowles was known to have stated that "what you have received in class instruction is exactly what was unfolded to our Leader and subsequently through four outstanding followers, three of whom had many years of personal association with Mrs. Eddy." As concerns Mr. Bowles' own dedicated service to the Christian Science Cause, he was a Christian Science Wartime Minister', a Christian Science Practitioner and Teacher, Committee on Publication for Georgia, a Christian Science Lecturer for many years, a frequent contributor to the Christian Science periodicals, and the Teacher of the Normal class in 1970, as well as serving in many other capacities for the Christian Science Movement. He and Mrs. Bowles, and his sister, Miss Edna Bowles, were the dearest friends to us all, loyal and faithful and tireless workers, loving examples for each of us to emulate.

Surely this is the purpose of the annual meetings of the associations of class-taught students of Christian Science -- to "lift up a standard" of genuine Christian Science: of clear, correct, practical metaphysics, effective healing, and inspired Christian living.

And the purpose is not only to set forth such a standard, but also to show each member something more of how he can attain it.

These three talks are designed to support and strengthen the efforts of all those who are preparing association addresses. They were delivered in Boston on June 4, 1975, as part of a three-hour Association Workshop, which was included in the events following the Annual Meeting of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts.

In the measure that our association addresses become fresher, deeper, clearer, more practical and more inspired, the strength and healing effectiveness of the Cause of Christian Science will be enhanced.

WRITING AN INSPIRED ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

DeWitt John

All of us know that Christian Science offers limitless possibilities for demonstration. All of us want to demonstrate it better. We know this Science offers the clear, pure, demonstrable metaphysics of Truth, and also the method of proof. But we need a systematic and correct understanding of the metaphysics, and of the method, in order to succeed in the healing work. To give the student this kind of understanding is the special purpose of class instruction and the annual association meeting. Such understanding enables the student to do effective healing work, and so fulfill a leading purpose of the marvelous system of spiritual education that our Leader, Mary Baker Eddy, has given us.

I remember a time, some twenty-five years ago, when I was wrestling with what seemed to me a huge assignment -- to write my first association address. One of our lecturers had recommended me, and he'd addressed this same group a couple of times. So one day I asked him: "What do you think I should say to them?"

His answer was quick and brief: "Tell 'em how to love, tell 'em how to heal, tell 'em how to grow!"

This was so fundamental I've never forgotten it. But of course, he didn't tell me how to "tell 'em." This is where the praying comes in, and the growing, for the one who's writing the address!

One thing to remember about an association meeting is that the people come seeking new light on the problems they haven't been able to solve. They've made demonstrations; they've had healings. But they're looking for new insight and inspiration in regard to the things they haven't worked out so far. This means the focus of the address must always be on how to demonstrate Christian Science more effectively in healing.

The people come to be <u>fed</u>. What they're fed ought to be substantial enough, deep enough, fresh enough, rich enough, stirring enough to nourish them for a whole year! They don't come to be entertained. They don't come for platitudes. Nor do they need to be regaled with human opinions, pet theories, or a pleasing personality. They certainly don't want a dull or vague or poorly organized dissertation. Nor will they be really satisfied with a warmed over version of last year's address. If that's what you give them, they'll know it!

What they yearn for is the clear, correct metaphysics of Christian Science -- a fresh and quickening message dealing with the nature of God and man, the spirit of Christ and the applicability of God's laws. This message can be so rousing they'll go home inspired to explore this wonderful Science more deeply, so practical they can actually put it to use in treatment, prayer, and demonstration, so pure there's no danger of their mistaking their way.

Now that's quite an order. How can we meet such a standard?

Christ Jesus gave us the answer in his conversation with the woman at Jacob's well. He spoke of "living water" and said: "Whosoever drinketh of the water that I shall give him shall never thirst; but the water that I shall give him shall be in him a well of water springing up into everlasting life." I

This tells us a great deal about the source to which we can look for the spiritual message of our association meeting. We can turn directly and unreservedly to infinite Truth, of which Mrs. Eddy writes, "Truth cannot be stereotyped; it unfoldeth forever." The living waters of Truth are ever-flowing, self-renewing, ever-satisfying. You can never use them up or wear them out. It's possible to demonstrate these facts in terms of an address that's fresh, exhilarating, though-awakening, healing. It's possible for the hearer to demonstrate them in terms of the spiritual unfoldment he needs.

In the Christian Science textbook Mrs. Eddy tells us that water symbolizes the elements of Mind.³ These spiritual elements give substance and inspiration to the address. If we draw deeply on the living waters of Truth, the elements of Mind, our address will illustrate the intelligence, animation, exactness, purity, and depth which are characteristic of the infinite Mind. It will be clear in focus, orderly in development, buoyant with Love -- and healing in its effects.

How can we draw effectively on these living waters, these elements of Mind?

No substitute exists for humble prayer and vigorous spiritual research. There isn't any shortcut. One might easily write a paper that flowed smoothly and sounded all right superficially. But an effective address must draw deeply from the infinite. It must speak right from the heart. It must be born of experience. It must be based on actual proof. And it needs to come out of thorough, systematic study of the Bible and our Leader's writings, with very generous use of the Concordances. The need is for deep thought and spiritual reasoning, new fresh unfoldments of Truth, and for most careful attention to the scientific accuracy of our statements.

We've barely scratched the surface of what these books have to tell us about the nature of God, the real man, the real universe, and the method of demonstration: We've only begun to draw upon the spiritual treasures they contain, the spiritual ideas and concepts that are endless in number, dazzling in their clarity, sparkling in freshness, purifying in influence, and healing in their results. Take the Concordances and explore everything Mrs. Eddy tells us on some particular subject -- not just one statement but everything she has to say -- and soon you'll find new lines of thought, new vistas for discovery, unfolding before you. Such a study brings into view new landmarks in your own advancing spiritual understanding.

An association address offers a unique opportunity because of its length. One can go thoroughly and deeply into a subject. Certainly the address should plunge beneath the familiar words and superficial views. It should be free of cliches and fresh in both thought and expression. It should introduce the students to new realms for thought and research and prayer -- realms already laid out in Mrs. Eddy's writings and the Bible. It should offer inspiring approaches to the fundamentals of Christian metaphysics. It ought to go deeper than is possible within the compass of an article in our periodicals or a Christian Science lecture. It should always be designed to fulfill the unique purpose of spiritual teaching -- and that purpose is demonstration, the restoration of Christian healing.

The prayerful work in preparation for an association meeting can be done by the speaker, the members of the executive committee, and the individual students -- each in his own way and according to his own involvement in the occasion. Each one can actively pray for the inspiration, receptivity, joy, and love that will insure that the association day is a healing occasion.

If this work is well and thoroughly done, then those who hear the address will learn much more about "how to love, how to heal, and how to grow." They will see fulfilled the promise of Isaiah: "Therefore with joy shall ye draw water out of the wells of salvation."4

EFFECTIVELY COMMUNICATING AN ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

Judging from the quality of association meetings these days, we have some exceptionally fine speakers, but from all reports there just aren't enough to go around. Too many associations are not getting what they deserve. But they will when everyone who accepts an invitation to speak sincerely and persistently does what he has to do to be a good communicator. As Mrs. Eddy says, "Sincerity is more successful than genius or talent." Isn't that comforting!

So let's discuss a few points that may be of some help. First, examine your motives. Before you start to develop your talk, ask yourself: Is my motive purely to glorify God and bless this association? Along this line let me tell you about my first invitation to address Annual Meeting in Boston. I saturated my paper with familiar Bible quotes and Mrs. Eddy's best known words, sent my paper to my Primary teacher, and asked him for an opinion. The paper came back with just one comment: "Everyone in the audience has the books, too." Why had I loaded the talk with citations; not only citations, but Christian Science jargon, and metaphysical cliches and platitudes as well. When I examined my motives, I found that I had been hoping to impress my audience.

MORAL: Impress -- sure, but do so Mrs. Eddy's way. She urges us to: "...impress humanity with the genuine recognition of practical, operative Christian Science." 2 "...practical, operative Christian Science." Sure, impress -- but with practical, provable truths.

Nothing really communicates but what you know to be true, what you have proved of the Truth. You communicate with your life. What means a lot to you will mean a lot to your audience. How right Paul was when he said, "I had rather speak five words with my understanding, . .than ten thousand words in an unknown tongue."3

MORAL: Stick to the ideas that unfold to you. Beware of "stereotyped borrowed speeches."4

Now an effective communication may not come easily. Rarely is it just written. It's rewritten and rewritten and rewritten. So the next point is this -- most everything improves with editing. If the speaker isn't also a good editor, he needs someone who can help him see what needs revising, adding, deleting. His sounding board, so to speak, need not be a committee; it can be family, or speech professional, or a friend, or a secretary. Often after writing something that

is crystal clear to me, my secretary asks, "What does this mean?" "Well," I explain, "it is very simple. It means I go on to explain, and I can see by the look on her face she's thinking: "Well, why didn't you say that."

No matter how well you think you have developed your talk, it won't be any better than the way it's received. And the time to find our whether you have gotten it right is before you make the address.

MORAL: Get yourself a private audience to practice on. Never practice on the public.

Next point: To speak or not to speak is the question. So what if one who has agreed to speak prays for inspiration and guidance but gets no fresh spiritual insights, has no spiritual convictions that he is bursting to share. Under such circumstances should he withdraw? Well, association day is the most important day in a class-taught student's year. So if the speaker's motive for accepting the invitation was to bless the association, he can withdraw for the same reason. If he feels strongly that it's demonstration to do so, withdrawing can bless everyone concerned. In the words of James Russell Lowell: "Blessed are they that have nothing to say and can't be persuaded to say it."

MORAL: If you have nothing to say, don't let personal sense persuade you to prove it!

Scientifically speaking, as it has been brought out many times today, there is an ever-available abundance of fresh ideas which everyone has the God-given ability to respond to and utilize. Many of our speakers consistently prove this. They know that an old, revamped talk is "sounding brass, or a tinkling cymbal"5 without fresh ideas. In their hearts they know they have let the association down, unless the vitality and the spontaneity of the Christ prevail.

MORAL: Be fair to the association and be honest with yourself.

Next, a three-pronged point: Let's say you have good ideas, develop them, give the talk, but the response is disappointing. What went wrong? Well, perhaps your writing became cluttered and your ideas obscured because you were not alert to some things we all need to be alert to. So let's examine a few of them.

First: The Christ, Truth, is simple. Personal sense would have us hide it with pretentious words and involved sentences. Oh, such pontificating may satisfy the ego, but such talk does not feed the hungering heart. We're all familiar with Mrs. Eddy's assurance: "When the heart speaks, however simple the words, its language is always

acceptable to those who have hearts." There's nothing in there about having to be an orator or a mental giant. %

MORAL: Dare to keep it simple!

Second: The kingdom of God, Truth, is within; no truths are lacking in anyone. Yet a sense of superiority often tempts the speaker to be didactic, as if he needs to teach some truths his audience doesn't already include. But communicating is not thought transference; it's an awakening process. The Christliness of the message touches the receptive thought and reveals truths already within. As Mrs. Eddy states, "The intercommunication is always from God to His idea, man."

MORAL: Don't be tempted to try to stand in God's stead. His Christ communicates itself and takes the speaker along for the ride. The message supports the messenger.

Third: Beware of self-righteousness. A speaker may vow:
"None of that holier-than-thou stuff for me," then turn
right around and ask rhetorical questions that make his
audience burn with guilt. Or he may accept the Biblical
imperative, "Come now, and let us reason together," then
load up his talk with "you must," "you should," "you
ought to" do this or do that. Well now, we welcome Jesus'
instructions and Mrs. Eddy's admonitions, but honestly,
do you want an association speaker telling you what to do?
I don't. Not that I always know, but don't preach to me
-- awaken me. Awaken me to see it for myself! And then
inspire me to do it!

MORAL: You can lead the human mind, but you sure can't drive it.

Next point and it's a big one: Keep them listening. Now it takes some doing to hold your listeners' attention. Does it begin when you start to make the talk? Far from it. It begins when you start to develop the talk. How do you respond to the ideas that come to you. Do they move you? Do they hold your attention? When you develop the talk, does one main idea lead to another and expand on your central theme? Are your lesser ideas relevant to your main ones? Be cohesive. No matter how much you cherish some idea, if it's irrelevant, save it. There will be another time.

MORAL: Stick to a straight line. If your talk wanders, so will your listener. And if your talk is dull, he will do worse than wander. He will go fast asleep!

No lullaby can lull a listener like a talk that just drones on and on at one level of intensity without any change of pace. How dull a talk is without valleys and peaks of thought, and without interesting variations on your main theme. Now certainly Ravel's "Bolero" puts no one to sleep. But, over and over, one central theme is repeated. Oh, those variations! How they hold your attention! One builds to the next and contributes to that glorious, hair-raising, spine-tingling finale. Spiritual ideas can be utilized even more effectively. Indeed, restatement of your main theme in a variety of ways is indispensable to an attention-holding talk.

In addition to mental variety, we need vocal variety. When you expound on metaphysics, remember how short one's span of concentration is. So break it up. Use illustrations. There is nothing better than "for example," or "for instance." Turn away from your prepared address and relate a healing. Use an anecdote. Tell a story. Jesus taught with parables and so did Mrs. Eddy. She never hesitated to inject humor where it came naturally or brought home a point, and thank goodness she did. Physical variety helps, too. Have frequent standing breaks, sing a hymn or two, and whether you stand or sit, change your position from time to time.

MORAL: You'll get your listeners' attention and you will keep their attention when you do what you have to do to deserve it.

Next point: Remember you are giving a talk -- not a reading. A speaker said, "I can write it, but I can't talk it, so I just read it." Just reading an address is inexcusable. Some members say their associations have been read to so often that they prefer to stay at home and read to themselves. This is laughable, but true -- and it is a situation that doesn't need to exist. We don't have to put up with this, really we don't. Every speaker can speak effectively enough to address an association, if he makes the effort. Sure it is hard work, but it is worth it. Practice. Get used to the sound of your voice. Whether you like it or not will determine whether your listeners like it or not. Read the Bible Lesson out loud. Or work with a speech professional.

You know, written words and spoken words are like different languages. We write one way and speak another. So use a tape recorder; it won't bite you. Tape your talk, listen to it, simplify whatever isn't clear, shorten the sentences to fit the way you speak, change the words until the whole thing sounds natural, conversational. Then your talk will hang together, will come alive, will communicate. What communicates is the real you behind the words.

MORAL: Success in communicating is as Mrs. Eddy says about any worthwhile endeavor: "...self-denial, sincerity, Christianity, and persistence alone win the prize, as they usually do in every department of life."9

Now for the most important point of all -- love for the association members.

When does the speaker start to love them? When he is getting prayed up to give the talk? Does he sort of take love off the shelf with sugar tongs and lay it on a rose leaf? Or, as Mrs. Eddy did, does he make strong demands on love, call for active achievements as its results. 10 Let me ask you this: Won't the association members know that the speaker loves them if he has prayed and listened and written and rewritten and prayed and rewritten and prayed and rewritten and practiced and simplified and prayed and practiced and tape-recorded and made his words conversational and prayed himself out of the way? Won't they know he loves them?

This kind of love can lift the meeting above the sense of speaker and audience and unite them with the one Mind. Listening together and responding together, speaker and listener can freely experience the flow of Mind's ideas. Doing this, speaker and listener are certain to know that because they have gathered together in Christ's name, there he is in the midst of them. This is effective communicating.

DEVELOPING THE CONTENT OF AN ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

Every year the class-taught student meets with the fellow members of his association to renew and extend the inspiration of his Primary teaching. In an original address prepared specifically for that event, the teacher or the invited speaker reviews the basic elements of class instruction, elements that represent the tools the student uses in furthering his spiritual progress, in working out his salvation, in deepening his understanding of God and man, and their eternal relationship. In one sense, the address is a continuation of class -- not an additional thirteenth lesson or fourteenth lesson, but further penetration into the Science of being with fresh, new insights, showing how fundamental spiritual truths are applicable to today's needs. This includes, first of all, the needs of the individual, but also the needs of our church, and the needs of mankind.

I. What It Is

This unique, particular, highly-specialized, once-a-year opportunity for spiritual refreshment, an event reserved exclusively for the class-taught student, is designed to lift him to still higher views of spiritual individuality, of man's potential as the image and likeness of the creator, his unlimited capabilities as a God-centered instead of a self-centered expression, and his freedom and dominion in demonstrating immunity to the laws of matter and the beliefs of mortal existence.

The association address is best prepared as a single subject, well-developed, responsibly confirmed by the Bible and the writings of Mary Baker Eddy. The subject should be practical, its amplification specifically adapted to human needs. It should enable the hearer to pursue and accelerate his resolution of the problem of being. Subjects which I feel I have been able to develop to advantage include: The Search for Identity, The Eternal Noon of Being, Salvation Now, Freedom from Limitation, Living Under Authority, The Handling of Evil, The Science of the Christ, and The Anatomy of Love. Each subject should be distinct, so well organized that it stands on its own, each facet complementing the primary theme in a manner which sharpens the subject as a whole, bringing it into clearer focus, at the same time revealing its inexhaustible character. It should not be a potpourri of pet phrases, unrelated subtopics, generalizations that sound impressive but have little practical value. A generalization is helpful if it is followed up with specific and direct detail, with clearcut illustrations drawn from Scriptural narratives, from

personal experience or from contemporary events.

Organize the address so that it evolves logically and intelligently step by step, building gradually to the climax and conclusion. The introduction should not be overlong, but it should be sufficient to set the stage. The development should include several related subtopics, all exploratory of the subject itself, revealing progressively deeper considerations. By preparing first an outline of what you have decided to write you can quickly tell if the various points are related, follow in logical sequence, and truly develop with fresh inspiration the subject itself.

Write for a listening audience, not a reading audience. With rare exception, members of the association you address will have only one primary exposure to the address itself. They will have a secondary exposure by reading and pondering the list of citations you supply, citations which confirm the points you have made. If they are to grasp and retain what they will hear only once, it is important that your sentences not be overlong, that they not be burdened with loosely attached parenthetical clauses, that they be uncomplicated and as short as possible. Remember, they are to be heard and not read. If they are not easily followed or understood on that one single exposure, they are lost to the listener, and not even a study of the citations will recapture them.

Illustrations break the intensity of sustained concentration. They aid in clarifying points, in describing the practicality of metaphysical truths. But they should be kept in balance. They are not a substitute for metaphysical development. Nor should they be used to entertain. Association members come to be fed, spiritually fed, in a manner that no other activity established by Mrs. Eddy can duplicate. An association address is not a lecture, it is not a collection of unrelated articles suitable for publication in the periodicals, although parts of it may well be considered for a larger, more general audience. It is not a series of testimonies. It is not a warmed-over address from previous years presented to some other association.

The association address should be the result of prayer -deep, spiritual, conscientious prayer, the prayer that results
from faithful listening to the very ideas divine Mind is supplying, ideas that are fresh, pertinent, practical, demonstrable.
The address should be a Christian Science demonstration, worthy
of the time, energy, expense and devotion each association member has exerted in being present. It should inspire him in his
own further study during the year that follows. It should make
him a still more thorough student in his mastery of the letter,
in his imbibling of the spirit. It should lead to greater consecration, dedication and commitment in living the teachings of

Christian Science. It should make him a better practitioner, both for himself and others. It should quicken his healing ability, strengthen his conviction, contribute to instantaneous responses.

And it will do all this if it is the result of prayer. Such an address loses sight of personal prestige and egotistical exhibitionism. It never serves as a platform for pet projects or a sounding board for questionable metaphysical phrases -- phrases designed to startle rather than heal, to shock rather than inspire. It should not ride an author's hobby, his personal preferences, likes or dislikes regarding the teachings of Christian Science or its organization.

II. Church

The association address should fulfill our Leader's expectations. These are helpfully implied in her own addresses and messages for class-taught students. For example, in Chicago in 1888, in her address prepared for the National Christian Scientist Association, she cites as a reason for the convention: "We come to strengthen and perpetuate our organizations and institutions; and to find strength in union, -- strength to build up, through God's right hand, that pure and undefiled religion whose Science demonstrates God and the perfectibility of man." 1

The institution, church, has suffered severely in recent years. Who is better equipped to remedy this than the classtaught student of Christian Science? In an age when even the term "institution" is suspect, more than ordinary care is needed to strengthen and perpetuate it. But what is an institution? Simply a human organization. And any human organization in its elementary form is but a group of people who have joined together to better fulfill a common purpose. A bank is an institution to provide financial services. A school is an institution to provide learning techniques, to assist others in gaining an education. Marriage is an institution to fulfill family living, the rearing of children, the comfort, security and beauty of home. And church is an institution to spiritually enlighten, heal and save. It is a group of people like you and me who have been so blessed by the teachings of Christian Science that we have united out of gratitude to share those blessings with others.

We should speak to the class-taught student in ways that will help him to strengthen and perpetuate the institution, church. Here is the need: There are branch churches today that have no practitioner in their membership. But practically all of them have class-taught students. The association address should inspire them to prepare for the practice, even if it is on a part-time basis.

A branch church without a healing ministry cannot long If the student who has received class instruction does not respond to this serious need, what opportunity remains for survival? The healing ministry is why the church exists. A church that does not heal, that does not impart the spiritual enlightenment which leads to regeneration, is not a church. It is but a group of people, still banded together, who no longer have a real purpose. Other interests have distracted their devotion. Other values have dissipated their energies. The use of other means, other attempts to attract the newcomer, are never as availing unless motivated by the primary purpose for which the church exists -- to spiritually enlighten, heal and save, to share with others what has so richly blessed us. Changing the hours of the Sunday service in order to accommodate mortal mind, initiating a Wednesday noon meeting because fewer and fewer attend Wednesday evening -- these are not measures that attract and heal. It is really impossible to accommodate mortal mind. We waste our time and energies in trying to offer substitutes for the healing Christ.

These are issues which the class-taught student is equipped to resolve. He has an obligation to fulfill Mrs. Eddy's demonstration of organized church activity. He is prepared more than others to respect the institution, church, to love and strengthen it, to preserve and perpetuate it. No association address should be devoted entirely to this topic. But it has its place, especially right now because the need is so great.

Other issues affecting church to which you can address yourself from time to time include a better understanding of the role of The Mother Church; why its financial needs deserve the same thoughtful consideration as those of a branch church; the place and purpose of the periodicals and how the classtaught student can make a substantial contribution by writing for them; and the unique function of The Christian Science Monitor. Too many of those who have had the advantage of class instruction are still confused over the Monitor's place. Some with strong partisam views refuse to subscribe. Some subscribe, but refuse to read. Some read but withhold issues with articles contrary to their viewpoint. Again, no association address should be devoted entirely to the Monitor. But unhealed conditions like those just mentioned deserve your thoughtful, loving and even fervent consideration.

In this way we contribute to the second purpose of the Chicago convention of 1888: "We come . . . to find strength in union, -- strength to build up, through God's right hand, that pure and undefiled religion whose Science demonstrates God and the perfectability of man."

In human relations unity is no accident. It has to be worked for. A church that has a united membership is bound to grow. When united in fulfilling the purpose of church, there is no limit to its opportunity to bless -- to spiritually enlighten, heal and save. The class-taught student should be vitally concerned with the institution that made his class teaching possible. He can be addressed on these points constructively and sympathetically, and we can expect a favorable response.

Mrs. Eddy praised the functions of church in her address before the alumni of the Massachusetts Metaphysical College in 1895. Speaking to her students, as we might well address those in Christian Science students' associations, she said: "The systematized centres of Christian Science are lifegiving fountains of truth. Our churches, The Christian Science Journal, and the Christian Science Quarterly, are prolific sources of spiritual power whose intellectual, moral, and spiritual animus is felt throughout the land. Our Publishing Society, and our Sunday Lessons, are of inestimable value to all seekers after Truth."2

III. Healing Ministry

A second area for consideration is the healing ministry. It is more important than the first. Church is vital, but as already touched upon, no church can fulfill its purpose without healing. Not only should its organizational efforts be healing, but church members themselves need to be successfully engaged in the healing and regeneration of others.³

Members of an association should be reminded of the great need for more workers in the practice. After all, class-taught students constitute the primary reservoir for future practitioners. If we would be obedient to our Leader's expectation that each student learn to heal, we should use every opportunity at association meetings to review Mrs. Eddy's instructions to her followers.

Recent conversation with a class-taught student revealed that his teacher never encouraged her pupils to enter the practice. Whenever they brought up the subject, her response was: "You are not ready. This is a calling." How contrary this seems to Mrs. Eddy's own words: "Christians are under as direct orders now, as they were then, to be Christlike, to possess the Christ-spirit, to follow the Christ-example, and to heal the sick as well as the sinning. . Our Master said to every follower: 'Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature! . . . Heal the sick! . . . Love thy neighbor as thyself!""4

Had every class-taught student responded to these commands seriously the volume of those listed in the Journal would be

far greater. There is a tremendous need for full-time practitioners. The speaker should encourage those not engaged in the practice to give it prayerful consideration. They should prepare themselves regardless of human age. Not too long ago The Mother Church accepted an applicant in his nineties.

How should they prepare? Through deeper study, consecration, dedication, commitment. They should set aside time each day for nothing but practice. They should strive to spiritualize thought. Because Spirit is the only attraction, their higher attainments in spiritual consciousness will fulfill Jesus' words: "And I, if I be lifted up from the earth, will draw all men unto me."5

They should cultivate opportunities to present Christian Science to those in need. This is not to proselyte. It is not to indoctrinate. It is to be alert in discovering the unprejudiced and responding to his need through the sharing of literature, through presenting a copy of Science and Health.

It is wise to review Christian Science treatment, not only for the benefit of those not yet in the practice, but for the seasoned practitioner as well. Remind them of the many ways of giving a treatment, what it is, what its basic elements are, and what tools the practitioner can draw upon in making his treatments inspired, effective, sufficient.

From time to time the ethics of the practice should be touched upon, reminders as to the confidential relationship between practitioner and patient, what the practitioner's fee should be, and how he should keep his practice in good balance with those who are entirely new to Christian Science.

Those already in the practice sometimes feel their inspiration is exhausted. Comfort them. Encourage them. Feed them with new inspiration. Remind them of Love's role in the healing work, the spiritual sense of love, the love with which Jesus loved and to which his disciples were urged to respond.

And please remind the experienced practitioners to take care of themselves, to not neglect their own work in demonstrating salvation. Remind them how to handle the beliefs of pressure, time, impositions by thoughtless patients.

Our healing ministry is for all mankind. Through it men and women of all nations are blessed. Physical healing is often the means of introduction to the more serious aspect of Christian Science, the healing of sin. Significantly, Mrs. Eddy refers to this in her remarks at the Chicago convention in 1888. They had come together, she explained: "... mutually to aid one another in finding ways and means for helping the whole human family; ..."6 In the same address she adds: "The Christian Scientist loves man more because

he loves God most."⁷ The association speaker can lift the thought of the members to take in this larger view of service to mankind, a service prompted by divine Love and made practical and satisfying in the healing ministry.

IV. Individual Growth

A third area of consideration and the most important one of all is to promote individual spiritual growth. The other two areas, already described, are completely dependent upon it. Unless there is individual spiritual growth, there is no healing ministry. If there is no healing ministry, there is little to be said for church. Therefore, the greater emphasis of the association address should be on this point. In her address at the Chicago convention, Mrs. Eddy summarized the reason for the meeting by saying: "This purpose is immense, and it must begin with individual growth, a 'consummation devoutly to be wished.'"8 Then she challenged her listeners: "How many are there ready to suffer for a righteous cause, to stand a long siege, take the front rank, face the foe, and be in the battle every day?"9

This requires growth, individual spiritual growth. And the association speaker should do everything he can to promote it. How?

By encouraging the member to become a more effective student. Both knowledge of the letter and comprehension of the spirit need encouragement, assistance, and fresh inspiration.

No one can grow spiritually without first enlarging his concept of his creator. The speaker should aid in bringing deeper insights as to God's nature and character. He should explore the infinite meaning and relationship of the synonyms. He should amplify them in ways that enable the student to distinguish clearly the character of each and the synonymous nature of each.

Our textbook reminds us: "We must look deep into realism instead of accepting only the outward sense of things." The speaker should remind his listeners that we are students of divine metaphysics. We are metaphysicians, not matter physicians. We are not smatterers, but deep spiritual thinkers. This requires continually new, fresh inspiration, vistas of the infinite little known or realized. It requires greater unfoldment of the beauty, power, presence and holiness of the eternal. It requires a sense of divine Love that far exceeds mankind's meager concepts of this tremendous synonym. It means cultivating spiritual perception and discernment, and living what we see.

New views of man should then be described, man the image and likeness of God, the idea of divine Principle. If the

word "idea" seems illusive, consider this dictionary definition: "A conception of any perfection." Il Jesus urged man to be perfect as his Father, as perfect as God. I? Then man, the idea of God, must be the conception of the perfect creator. Another definition of idea is: "A real likeness or representation." It is reminds us of the statement of creation in Genesis: "And God said, Let us make man . . . after our likeness." I Man, then, as the idea of God, must be the real likeness or representation of divine Mind. A third definition of idea is: "An embodiment of the essential nature and character of something." Is Man, the idea of God, is therefore the embodiment of the essential nature and character of the divine. Not a physical embodiment, but a mental and spiritual one. Not God in man, but man the reflection of the spiritual qualities that constitute the infinite. Mrs. Eddy reminds us: "The good you do and embody gives you the only power obtainable." 16

We should clarify man's purpose, his reason for being. We should help the association member to realize how absolutely essential he is to God's completeness and perfection. We should review his purpose, his usefulness, his contribution in doing God's will, in bearing witness to what God is.

To help mortals in overcoming the beliefs of age and limitation we should remind them of what Mrs. Eddy says about man expressing infinity, 17 that his potential is way beyond what the ordinary mortal admits possible, that each individual has talents seldom realized. 18

We should explain how to handle the arguments of decline, the aggressive suggestion that it is time to check out, that somehow one should no longer seek God's help in overcoming the arguments of age. Members should be roused to challenge the devilish suggestions that there is nothing left to do but await the inevitable.

Another point related to individual spiritual growth is salvation. Unfortunately, many students neglect this. They either do not take it seriously or they postpone it to a more convenient time. But the Apostle Paul emphasized the nowness of salvation. 19 And our Leader reminds us that we cannot escape the obligation of evangelizing human selfhood. 20

Salvation requires the spiritualization of consciousness. It is based on love for God. We must love Him enough that we love sin less and less, are impressed by evil on a diminishing scale, are able to discount physical sense evidence more and more.

Salvation is also linked to the commandment of loving our fellow man. This is the role of apostleship. We have all been blessed many times over through the healing ministrations of Christian Science. But having been saved in this way we have an obligation to save others. And this is the meaning

of apostleship. An apostle is one who has been saved to heal and save someone else. This very act results in further salvation on our part. Does not our Leader raise this hope when she writes: "Christianity is again demonstrating the Life that is Truth, and the Truth that is Life, by the apostolic work of casting out error and healing the sick"?21

No matter how often the subject is repeated, the speaker should give sufficient time to the handling of animal magnetism. He should explain in terms that cannot be misunderstood what it is, its present forms and influence, and how to master it.

In her address before the alumni of the Massachusetts Metaphysical College in 1895 -- all class-taught students -- Mrs. Eddy issued this warning: "The teacher in Christian Science who does not specially instruct his pupils how to guard against evil and its silent modes, and to be able, through Christ, the living Truth, to protect themselves therefrom, is committing an offense against God and humanity. With Science and Health for their textbook, I am astounded at the apathy of some students on the subject of sin and mental malpractice, and their culpable ignorance of the workings of these -- and even the teacher's own deficiency in this department."22

We should remind the class-taught student how to work for himself, how to do this each day with inspiration, freshness, courage. As he identifies himself to himself as the child of God, he will strive for obedience to the First Commandment, establish his innocency, and thereby demonstrate his protection.

The speaker should lift his audience to a climax of individual spiritual growth through his clear enunciation of the influence of the Christ, the divine presence always speaking to us, always urging us to respond to the divine will, always prompting us to adhere to the spiritual idealism which puts off the old man, puts on the new, and makes salvation practical.

Listeners should return to their homes inspired, uplifted, encouraged, refreshed, renewed, dedicated to the fulfillment of God's purpose.

FOREWORD

As an activity of The Mother Church, a Christian Science students association is engaged in a very essential spiritual mission. It carries forward the unique means provided by our Leader, Mary Baker Eddy, in the Church Manual for continued instruction and growth in the understanding and demonstration of Christian Science.

1. ASSOCIATION STRUCTURE AND GOVERNMENT

1-1 Membership

A student of Christian Science becomes a member of an association upon completion of Primary class instruction with an authorized teacher. The fact that he has had class instruction with that teacher can never be changed. The teacher will always have record that he taught the pupil, and the association will always have record that the pupil was taught by the teacher. (See 1-10, 1-11.)

However, The Mother Church recognizes the legal right of a pupil to disassociate himself from the association if that is his wish, and no longer to receive mailings, be on any address list, or otherwise be considered a member of the association. In such circumstances, the association's records should continue to show that the pupil was taught by the teacher in order to uphold the requirement of the Church Manual that a pupil receive class instruction only once unless his teacher is officially declared disloyal by The Christian Science Board of Directors and his pupils eligible to be taught in accordance with Article XXVI, Section 8, of the Manual. person has been taught in Christian Science, and provided his teacher remains loyal, he cannot deny the fact of his teaching and thereby free himself to seek class from another teacher.

The purpose of an association is always to heal and to support its members in their steps Spiritward.

1-2 Officers and executive committee

When the teacher is no longer present, and the executive committee is carrying forward the association's activities, it is important that the association be democratic enough to get the full benefit of its members' ideas and inspiration and prayer.

1-2 Officers and executive committee (continued)

The experiences of associations without teachers indicate the wisdom of having officers and members of the executive committee elected by the membership as a whole, of having rotation in office, and of permitting the membership as a whole to decide important questions. It is often possible to determine the wishes of the membership by a mail ballot rather than by extensive debate and balloting at the association meeting.

Each association is, of course, free to establish its own procedures, but many find it useful to stipulate a three-year term of office for executive committee members. Sometimes the Secretary and Treasurer serve as members of the executive committee, sometimes they do not. But in either case their terms are not necessarily governed by the rotation-in-office rule. Associations have generally found it wise, however, to take care that no individual assumes the role of being "in charge," and while it is helpful to have a Secretary and Treasurer (often the same individual) who are experienced in the work, the positions are not usually regarded as perpetual. Both the Secretary and Treasurer report to the executive committee, and it is helpful to have it clearly understood that the executive committee has ultimate responsibility for conducting the affairs of the association.

It is customary for executive committees to elect from among their members each year someone to serve as Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

1-3 Association bylaws

In instances where bylaws have not been provided by the teacher, association executive committees are encouraged to draw up a set as soon as possible for consideration and ratification by the association membership.

1-3 Association bylaws (continued)

There is a sample set of bylaws which may be adopted or adapted. These may be obtained from the Board of Education. In preparing association bylaws, parliamentary procedures are usually followed so far as they support the purpose and activities of the association.

1-4 Finances, salaries, and expenses

The primary purpose of an association executive committee is to provide for the continuity of the association, as provided by our Leader, Mary Baker Eddy, in the Church Manual. An important element in this work is to arrange the association's finances in such a way that provision is made for the ability of the association to meet its expenses for a guest speaker, and other financial obligations, year after year.

Precisely how an association works out these details is a matter of the association's own demonstration. It is possible, however, while the association still has a sizable membership, to arrange things in such a way that within a reasonable number of years the association can cover its expenses by interest earned on its capital, thereby protecting its ability to maintain the same level of operations in years ahead when there are fewer members making financial contributions. On the other hand, there are some associations which use their capital to cover expenses and still manage to demonstrate very adequate financial means from year to year.

Service as Secretary and Treasurer usually receives remuneration. It is recommended that the association obtain tax advice as to the status of those who receive remuneration and whether or not governmental reports are required.

1-4 Finances, salaries, and expenses (continued)

The guest speaker usually receives a fee plus expenses. The amount of the fee is determined by the executive committee in accordance with the association bylaws (see 2-2 for further guidance).

In some jurisdictions (including a majority of the states in the United States) nonprofit organizations are exempt from paying sales taxes on their purchases. Your Committee on Publication would have this information for the state or country where your association is located.

1-5 <u>Income taxes</u> (Please refer to Supplement Section for latest information)

a) United States: The Internal Revenue Service has ruled that Christian Science students associations are integral activities of The Mother Church and thus they are exempt from United States income tax. Contributions, dues, gifts, legacies, bequests, and devises to associations are deductible for income, gift, and estate tax purposes as provided in the various sections of the Internal Revenue Code.

As integral activities of The Mother Church, the associations should use The Mother Church's tax identification number, 04-2254742, in verifying their tax exempt status in any reporting made to the United States Internal Revenue Service.

The expenses of class instruction and attending association meetings cannot be deducted as contributions to a religious organization. However, certain individuals, such as <u>Journal</u>-advertising practitioners, and others whose employment requires class instruction, may deduct transportation and other expenses incurred in attending association meetings. (See Section 1-4 above, regarding state sales tax.)

1-5 Income taxes (continued)

b) Other countries: Associations outside the United States should consult competent tax counsel as to their rights and obligations.

1-6 Benevolence

If members of an association travel a long distance to attend the association meeting, some associations establish a fund to assist with the transportation and other expenses of members when needed. Some associations have benevolence funds to assist needy members.

Grants are available from the Treasurer of The Mother Church for attendance at association meetings by students from developing or restricted countries and, in unusual circumstances, from some other areas.

1-7 Trusts and other investments for associations

In considering how to accumulate and manage funds for both current and future expenses, associations may wish to investigate several possibilities, including money market funds, certificates of deposit with banks, mutual funds, government bonds or notes, and savings accounts. As an association's assets increase, it might consider placing its funds under professional management, including the establishment of a trust, either revocable or irrevocable.

A <u>revocable trust</u> is a trust which the association could amend or revoke, or from which it could withdraw principal. The Christian Science Trustees for Gifts and Endowments do not act as trustees for

1-7 Trusts and other investments for associations (cont.)

revocable trusts. This type of trust could be established with a bank, another financial institution or an individual or individuals, as trustee(s). Under such a trust: the income would be paid regularly to the association; the association may withdraw all or any part of the trust principal at any time; the trust may be amended or revoked, in whole or in part, at any time; and it could be worded that when the trust terminates (usually when the association disbands), the assets then remaining in the trust be given to The Mother Church.

An irrevocable trust is a trust from which the association could receive the income but could not withdraw any of the principal, and which cannot be amended or revoked. Many associations have established irrevocable trusts with the Christian Science Trustees for Gifts and Endowments, who are assisted in administering the trusts by a well-regarded Boston trust company. Under such a trust: the trust income is paid quarterly to the association; no trust principal may be revoked or withdrawn at any time; the trust may not be amended or revoked at any time; the funds placed in the trust will be professionally managed in the same manner as the invested funds of The Mother Church; and when the trust terminates (usually when the association disbands), a gift is made to The Mother Church of all the assets then remaining in the trust. In order to establish such a trust, a minimum funding amount is required. inquire as to current minimum amount.) Once such a trust is established, additions may be made to the trust at any time.

1-8 Financial records

It is helpful for an association to keep cancelled checks, receipts, bank statements, et cetera for six years. Tax records such as forms 1099 should be kept for three years after filing. If benevolence is provided to assist needy members, careful records should be kept of the payments and recipients.

1-9 Inactive status

Occasionally a member who feels it is no longer possible physically to attend association meetings, or unable to receive personal mail, asks to withdraw. This usually incorrectly conveys what is intended. Such a member may be placed on "inactive status."

Many associations have found it useful to reassure members who are presently experiencing difficulties and are placed on "inactive" status that they are now, and always will be, loved members of the association family. Unless there is a special personal reason why they do not wish to receive association mailings, they should know that their membership is intact regardless of attendance or financial contributions, and that they are welcome to receive all mailings:

1-10 Withdrawals

If a member wishes to disassociate himself totally from the association and is firm in this decision, as for example, if he has embraced the teachings of another denomination, he should be permitted to withdraw. In such cases, the Clerk of The Mother Church should be notified stating the reasons for the withdrawal. The association's records will always show that the individual was taught by the teacher.

1-11 Disbandment of association

- a) There is no provision for the members of two or more associations to unite or for the entire membership of one association to be invited to attend the meeting of another association in a body.
- b) An association is encouraged to continue as long as possible. When the number of active, participating members becomes quite small, the question of disbandment sometimes comes up for consideration. The decision may be reached by a majority vote of the active membership or as otherwise provided for in your bylaws.
- c) In the United States, the Internal Revenue Service has ruled that associations of Christian Science students are activities of The Mother Church, a religious organization, and therefore all are tax exempt. Upon dissolution such a tax-exempt organization must leave all of its funds to another tax-exempt organization having a similar purpose. Usually the funds are sent to The Mother Church.
- d) When an association disbands, it is helpful for it to provide a simple, dated statement to its members verifying that they are members in good standing of the association and that it is disbanding.
- e) Instructions concerning the disposal of the files of an association upon its disbanding may be obtained from the Records Administrator, Records Management, at The Mother Church.

2. THE ASSOCIATION MEETING

2-1 Attendance

Invitations to visitors should be extended only on an individual basis to those who make formal request. It is optional with each executive committee whether or not to admit visitors. Only pupils of a loyal teacher may be invited to an association meeting.

A frequently used procedure concerning those who are eligible to attend association meetings in addition to their own is as follows:

- a) The one who addresses an association of which he is not a member is free to attend his own association as well.
- b) If a speaker is invited to address the association of which he is a member, he is eligible to apply to attend another association as a guest.
- c) The spouse of a speaker is free to attend his or her own association and, if invited, the one addressed by his or her spouse.
- d) A teacher is not free to attend an association of the pupils of another teacher, even if his or her spouse is addressing it as guest speaker.

2-2 Fees and expenses for speaker

One who is invited to address the association should receive a fee for preparing the address, as well as be reimbursed for travel to and from the meeting, and for related hotel and meal expenses.

Usually, the association establishes its own rate of payment which it offers to its speakers. Speakers are not encouraged to set their own rates, because circumstances vary widely from one association to another. The rate of reimbursement should be fair

2-2 Fees and expenses for speaker (continued)

"Teaching Christian Science shall not be a question of money" (Manual, p. 83), and the same standard applies to addressing associations. The fee for the speaker is an outward expression of the association's appreciation for the prayer, inspiration, and many hours of preparation that the address represents.

The fee usually is paid to the speaker before the association day is over. Reimbursement for the speaker's travel, hotel, and meal expenses is made upon submission of an itemized statement which provides receipts for the larger expenditures.

Currently, in the United States, a reasonable minimum for the association address would appear to be about \$1,000. Associations needing assistance in order to pay their speaker a reasonable fee should contact the Treasurer of The Mother Church.

2-3 The business session

The business of the association should be conducted by the executive committee in such a way that the full membership may ratify important decisions.

The business session should be brief so that the inspiration of association day is not cluttered by extended discussion of business details.

A business session is not a deliberative occasion like a branch church business meeting. Its purpose is primarily to inform the members of the conduct of association business. The reporting by the executive committee should be clear and full enough to ensure its accountability to the membership on all important decisions and policies. To keep the business session brief, a consensus or a vote of the members can usually be obtained by correspondence, and in the same way the members can be given much of the information they need.

2-3 The business session (continued)

The mental atmosphere of the association meeting should not be clouded by controversy or routine detail but should be kept spiritually clear and harmonious.

2-4 Special letters

Any special letter from The Christian Science Board of Directors should be read to all members and visitors by the guest speaker, or one appointed to do so by the executive committee.

2-5 Extracts from teacher's addresses

Associations whose teachers are no longer with them are encouraged to consider new material for their association meetings each year. Most associations feel it is progressive to have guest speakers with fresh inspiration rather than rely on extracts from their teacher's former addresses.

2-6 Social activities

An association meeting is in no sense a class reunion and it is undesirable for the executive committee to arrange social gatherings. Whatever individuals may wish to do as individuals about getting together with friends at their association is up to them. The objection is to doing this as organized social activity or giving a social gathering the status of a class activity.

2-7 Spouse of teacher

Under the Church Manual by our Leader, Mary Baker Eddy, pupils are taught only by the teacher. The spouse of a teacher, however loved and helpful he or she may be, has no official relationship to the pupils or to the pupils' association.

A teacher's spouse is not expected by The Mother Church to assume charge of the association when the teacher is no longer present. The government of an association when the teacher is no longer present does not normally go from teacher to spouse, but from teacher to the executive committee. Each association, however, is self-governed, with no direct supervision by The Mother Church, and there are some rare instances where a teacher's spouse takes charge. Although The Mother Church does not favor such an arrangement, it does not feel it has the right to intrude into the affairs of an association. The members themselves do, however, have the right to clarify the relationship and work out an acceptable solution.

2-8 Association meetings in two languages

If a teacher has taught in one language some years and in another language alternate years, his association meetings, when he is no longer present, must be held in two languages during the one day. The guest speaker should give the same message in each language.

- 3. SELECTING THE ONE TO CONDUCT THE ASSOCIATION MEETING,
 OFTEN REFERRED TO AS THE GUEST SPEAKER
- 3-1 Without Teachers. SECT. 2. Those beloved brethren whose teacher has left them, can elect an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association. (Church Manual, Article XXVII)

3-2 Responsibility of executive committee and membership

It is the annual demonstration of each association without a teacher prayerfully to choose and invite the one who is to conduct the association meeting in accordance with the Manual Article XXVII, Section 2.

Only pupils of loyal teachers may address an association and one so invited does not acquire any permanent standing relative to the association. The same speaker may be invited more than once.

Choosing the right person to address the annual association meeting each year is not just the responsibility of the executive committee. It is the demonstration of the entire association. In a very real sense the selection of the speaker expresses the association's thought about itself.

Good selection of the speaker begins by asking such questions as these:

- What is the purpose of our association meeting?
- Are we seeking that person, whether well-known or perhaps still undiscovered, who will best meet the need of our association on that special day?

3-3 Qualifications of an association speaker

The qualities sought in an association speaker are spirituality, a sound understanding of Christian Science, the ability to demonstrate Christian Science, and the ability to communicate Christian Science. Individuals who have these qualities and are using them may be recognized by their:

- effective healing work in the public practice;
- outstanding branch church work;
- articles published in the periodicals;
- effective work as a Committee on Publication, lecturer or in some other activity of The Mother Church.

The association needs to have adequate information about the one to whom it is entrusting its annual address. For example:

- Is the prospective speaker free of private theories and interpretations of Mrs. Eddy's writings?
- Is he class taught by a loyal teacher?
- Is he in full support of all Manual provisions?
- Does he have substantial experience as a working, demonstrating Christian Scientist?
- Does he express himself clearly?

No two associations go about selecting a speaker in exactly the same way. Some associations defer extending an invitation to a speaker unless at least one member of the executive committee knows something, preferably firsthand, about him. Some require unanimous agreement among committee members before sending the invitation. Names of prospective speakers should be welcomed from members, but the committee properly accepts responsibility for obtaining more information about speakers and makes the final decision.

The Mother Church neither maintains a list of names nor does it recommend prospective speakers.

3-4 When the speaker is contacted

Speakers normally are contacted more than a year in advance of the date of the meeting in order to give the speaker a full year for preparation of the address.

When a speaker is contacted, the committee should take some time to tell him about the association. That way he will know whether or not he wants to accept. It should be a demonstration for him as well as for the association.

The speaker should be briefed on what time will be available to him on association day, the length of the brief business meeting, and the time allowed for lunch, i.e. the agenda for the day.

It is thoughtful to say what fee is usually offered, in addition to hotel and travel expenses. That way he knows what to expect and how to plan.

If an association executive committee needs more information about an individual being considered to conduct a meeting, it should feel free to write to the individual.

The individual selected should be reminded that helpful information for guest speakers is available from the Board of Education.

3-5 Only one speaker

Article XXVII, Section 2, of the <u>Church Manual</u> by Mary Baker Eddy provides for an experienced Christian Scientist to conduct the meetings of an association whose teacher has left them. In the spirit of this By-Law, one person should assume the responsibility for the address given at the meeting.

It is important to avoid shorter papers by a number of speakers because an awkward situation could

3-5 Only one speaker (continued)

thereby result. Questions could arise as to whether these individuals who would play a substantial role in the day's program could properly accept invitations to conduct the meetings of other associations that same year within the letter or spirit of the By-Law referred to above.

4. THE ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

Every year the class-taught student meets with the fellow members of his association to renew and extend the inspiration of his Primary teaching. In an original address prepared specifically for that event, the invited speaker provides further penetration into the Science of being with fresh, new insights, showing how fundamental spiritual truths are applicable to today's needs. This includes, first of all, the needs of the individual, but also the needs of our church, and the needs of mankind.

The address is the main reason for bringing the members together each year, and it should occupy the major portion of the day.

4-1 Responsibility of executive committee to set standard for addresses

When the teacher is no longer in charge of the association it becomes the responsibility of the executive committee to maintain a high standard for the one who addresses the association as guest speaker. The committee should take the initiative to specify the number of hours reserved for the address, and to satisfy itself that the guest speaker fully understands that the association looks forward to material that will contribute substantially to the

4-1 Responsibility of executive committee to set standard for addresses (continued)

spiritual growth of each member. The speaker is entitled to keen and appreciative support as he prepares the address, and assurance that the committee is doing everything possible to provide a harmonious and receptive atmosphere when the address is presented.

4-2 Sharing the address

A brief summary of the presentation, including a list of subtopics and references from the Bible and the writings of or about Mrs. Eddy, may, at the discretion of the guest speaker, be given to the members and guests present at the meeting. The full text of the paper should not be distributed generally.

When a pupil because of extenuating circumstances is unable to attend his association meeting and does not attend the meeting of another association — or when the executive committee feels there is a special need — the committee, with the approval of the guest speaker, may permit the pupil to read the text, provided the pupil agrees to these conditions:

- He will make no copies or extracts.
- No one else will be permitted to read it.
- It will be returned by the specified date.

When the executive committee feels there is a special need, and the guest speaker approves, a pupil may be permitted to read the association presentation of a previous year provided that the pupil agrees to the conditions stated above.

GUEST SPEAKERS and ASSOCIATION ADDRESSES

MANUAL BYLAW

"Without Teachers. Sect. 2. Those beloved brethren whose teacher has left them, can elect an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association." (Church Manual, Article XXVII)

SELECTING A GUEST SPEAKER

Responsibility of executive committee and membership

It is the annual demonstration of each association without a teacher prayerfully to choose and invite the one who is to conduct the association meeting in accordance with the *Manual*, Article XXVII, Section 2.

Only pupils of loyal teachers may address an association and one so invited does not acquire any permanent standing relative to the association. The same speaker may be invited more than once.

Choosing the right person to address the annual association meeting each year is not just the responsibility of the executive committee. It is the demonstration of the entire association. In a very real sense the selection of the speaker expresses the association's thought about itself.

Good selection of the speaker begins by asking such questions as these:

- What is the purpose of our association meeting?
- Are we seeking that person, whether well-known or perhaps still undiscovered, who will best meet the need of our association on that special day?

Qualifications of an association speaker

The qualities sought in an association speaker are spirituality, a sound understanding of Christian Science, the ability to demonstrate Christian Science, and the ability to communicate Christian Science. Individuals who have these qualities and are using them may be recognized by their:

- effective healing work in the public practice;
- active in branch church work;
- articles published in the periodicals;
- effective work as a lecturer, Committee on Publication, or in some other activity of The Mother Church.

The association needs to have adequate information about the one to whom it is entrusting its annual address. For example:

- Is the prospective speaker free of private theories and interpretations of Mrs. Eddy's writings?
- Is he class taught by a loyal teacher?
- Is he in full support of all Manual provisions?
- Does he/she have substantial experience as a working, demonstrating Christian Scientist?
- Does he express himself clearly?

No two associations go about selecting a speaker in exactly the same way. Some associations defer extending an invitation to a speaker unless at least one member of the executive committee knows something, preferably firsthand, about him. Some require unanimous agreement among committee members before sending the invitation. Names of prospective speakers should be welcomed from members, but the committee properly accepts responsibility for obtaining more information about speakers and makes the final decision. It is not uncommon to interview by phone, or in person, the one who is being considered.

The Mother Church does not maintain a list of names nor does it recommend prospective speakers.

When the speaker is contacted

Speakers normally are contacted more than a year in advance of the date of the meeting in order to give the speaker a full year for preparation of the address.

When a speaker is contacted, the committee should take some time to tell him about the association. That way he will know whether or not he wants to accept. It should be a demonstration for him as well as for the association.

The speaker should be briefed on what time will be available to him on association day, the length of the brief business meeting, and the time allowed for lunch, i.e. the agenda for the day.

It is thoughtful to say what fee is usually offered, in addition to hotel and travel expenses. That way he knows what to expect and how to plan.

If an association executive committee needs more information about an individual being considered to conduct a meeting, it should feel free to write to the individual.

The individual selected should be reminded that helpful information for guest speakers is available from the Board of Education.

Speakers address one association annually

Article XXVII, Section 2 of the *Church Manual*, provides for an experienced Christian Scientist to conduct the meetings of an association whose teacher has left them.

Speakers address only one association per year. An association meeting represents more than a one day event. It is the culmination of a year of study and spiritual growth. It provides for the continuing care of an association by a teacher, not just for one day, but yearly. When the teacher is no longer present, there is provision for electing "... an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association." The members of the association can expect that the individual they elect is devoting his/her attention for the year to addressing their specific needs and supporting their spiritual growth. Having made a commitment to an association of pupils for a given year, it would not be appropriate for a speaker to divert his/her attention to caring for other associations. (See Manual, Article XXVI, Sections 2 and 6, and Article XXVII, Section 2).

THE ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

The Association Address

Every year the class-taught student meets with the fellow members of his association to renew and extend the inspiration of his Primary teaching. In an original address prepared specifically for that event, the invited speaker provides further penetration into the Science of being with fresh, new insights, showing how fundamental spiritual truths are applicable to today's needs. This includes, first of all, the needs of the individual, but also the needs of our church, and the needs of mankind.

The metaphysical address is the main reason for bringing the members together each year, and it should occupy the major portion of the day.

Responsibility of executive committee to set standard for address

When the teacher is no longer in charge of the association it becomes the responsibility of the executive committee to maintain a high standard for the one who addresses the association as guest speaker. The committee should take the initiative to specify the number of hours reserved for the address, and to satisfy itself that the guest speaker fully understands that the association looks forward to material that will contribute substantially to the spiritual growth of each member. The speaker is entitled to keen and appreciative support as he prepares the address, and assurance that the committee is doing everything possible to provide a harmonious and receptive atmosphere when the address is presented.

THE ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

In our correspondence over the years with associations that use guest speakers, certain basic points have emerged which appear to be common to the most helpful association addresses. Following is a compilation of comments about these points.

1. Basic metaphysics

The address should help the student grow in his grasp of deep and correct Christian metaphysics. So it should enlarge and deepen his concept of God, man, the Christ, and divine Science.

Mary Baker Eddy tells us (Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures, p. 258): "We know no more of man as the true divine image and likeness, than we know of God." An address, therefore, may properly include a fresh new amplification of some of the synonyms of God.

The daily impressions of physical sense testimony will even delude class-taught students, and cause them unconsciously to accept the arguments of mortality. The address can, therefore, include fresh inspired views of man's immortality, of identity, of the opportunities to demonstrate unlimited individuality.

It can also give a sense of newness, fresh views, inspiring discoveries of new ideas about God's creation, God's universe, thoroughly supported by our Leader's writings. It can convey the joy of seeing eternal Truth ever unfolding and stir thought to see the basic metaphysical truths of Christian Science freshly and in new applications.

There will also be need of an explanation of the Christ, its healing activity, and a recognition of the great Exemplar of that healing activity of the Christ, Christ Jesus.

2. Practice, healing and treatment

It is well to include in each association address a fresh and inspired review of the basic elements of Christian Science treatment, thus helping the student to become a better healer. The address should bring out aspects of the method of treatment and deal with questions that come up in the practice of Christian Science.

The practice should be held up as the ultimate goal of class teaching and a growing sense of individual Christliness as the preparation for practice. From time to time preparation, motivation, consistency, consecration, dedication, ministry, ethics, et cetera might be touched upon.

The address should strengthen the spiritual foundation of the student so as to increase his ability to rely radically on Truth for healing and counter the temptations and suggestions of materia medica.

3. Handling animal magnetism through regeneration

There should be thorough handling of the claims of animal magnetism, particularly those which seem to be active within our society today. New subtleties, arguments, approaches, guises and attractions of error should be identified and exposed as nothingness from the standpoint of God's allness.

The address should encourage the student to overcome wrong character traits, sinful tendencies, and erroneous patterns of thought that seem to be a part of human nature, in line with our Leader's statement that one main purpose of Christian Science is to take away the sins of the world, and her teaching that we must begin with ourselves.

4. Daily prayer for oneself

The address should remind the students of the necessity of regular daily work for themselves and should expand their grasp and deepen their perception of how this should be done. Prayer for oneself should include daily study and work for one's own spiritual growth. This spiritual growth will increase the student's ability to contribute to the healing mission of our Church.

5. An understanding of Church

The address should foster a right sense of organization, encourage better demonstration of unity in church affairs, and promote both metaphysical and practical support of the branch church and The Mother Church.

This discussion could provide a brief look at the latest steps being taken by The Mother Church to "reinstate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing" (Manual p. 17), and similar branch church programs.

This should all be related to the provisions in the <u>Church Manual</u>, showing how these are adequate to take care of all present and future needs.

6. Prayer for the world

It is well to include in each address some reference to community, national and world problems and the responsibility of Christian Scientists to pray for the resolution of them. How to do this in line with the fundamental teaching of love for God and man would include an explanation of how Christian Science can be applied to needs of immediate urgency in individual lives and world situations.

7. Mary Baker Eddy

Mrs. Eddy reminds us in <u>Science and Health</u> (p. 560): "To misunderstand Paul, was to be ignorant of the divine idea he taught. Ignorance of the divine idea betrays at once a greater ignorance of the divine Principle of the idea — ignorance of Truth and Love."

In order that members of the association may not find their understanding of the divine Principle darkened because they have grown dull in their appreciation of those who presented the divine idea, the association address should include specific reference to Mrs. Eddy. The material should be fresh and inspired, related to the subject of the address.

Also relevant is the importance of understanding Mrs. Eddy's life and work in the fulfillment of Biblical prophecy, including her work as Discoverer, Founder, Leader, and "a scribe under orders." A study of our Leader's own references to herself in her published writings will be helpful.

8. Quotations

Utmost care should be taken when using quotations by or about our Leader. Periodically, there is widespread circulation of statements and manuscripts falsely attributed to Mrs. Eddy, and much of this is said to come from addresses at meetings. While there are some unpublished quotations and anecdotes that can be verified by the Church History Department of The Mother Church, we ask those who address associations not to use heretofore unpublished statements by our Leader, even if they can be, or have been, authenticated. The source of any anecdote or statement used should be readily accessible in publications available in Christian Science Reading Rooms.

OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

When the teacher is no longer present, and the executive committee is carrying forward the association's activities, it is important that the association be democratic enough to get the full benefit of its members' ideas and inspiration and prayer.

The experiences of associations without teachers indicate the wisdom of having officers and members of the executive committee elected by the membership as a whole, of having rotation in office, and of permitting the membership as a whole to decide important questions. It is often possible to determine the wishes of the membership by a mail ballot rather than by extensive debate and balloting at the association meeting.

Each association is, of course, free to establish its own procedures, but many find it useful to stipulate a three-year term of office for executive committee members. Sometimes the Secretary and Treasurer serve as members of the executive committee, sometimes they do not. But in either case their terms are not necessarily governed by the rotation-in-office rule. Associations have generally found it wise, however, to take care that no individual assumes the role of a teacher, and while it is helpful to have a Secretary and Treasurer (often the same individual) who are experienced in the work, the positions are not usually regarded as perpetual. Both the Secretary and Treasurer report to the executive committee, and it is helpful to have it clearly understood that the executive committee has ultimate responsibility for conducting the affairs of the association.

It is customary for executive committees to elect from among their members each year someone to serve as Chairman and Vice-Chairman.

BYLAWS

In instances where neither bylaws nor directives have been provided by the teacher, association executive committees are encouraged to draw up a set of bylaws as soon as possible for consideration and ratification by the association membership.

In preparing association bylaws, parliamentary procedures are usually followed so far as they support the purpose and activities of the association.

Enclosed is a sample set of bylaws which may be adopted or adapted.

BYLAWS

The Christian Science Association of

the Pupils of John Doe, C.S.B.

- I. <u>Authority for Organization</u>. This association, The Christian Science Association of the Pupils of John Doe, C.S.B., is organized under the authority of Article XXVI, Section 6, of the *Manual of The Mother Church*, by Mary Baker Eddy.
- II. Purpose. The purpose of this association is to further the teachings of Christian Science as set forth in the writings of Mary Baker Eddy and specifically in the Church Manual. Its purpose is not the exercise of parliamentary democracy, but rather is completely religious in character. For this reason the business of the association will be conducted as far as possible by its Chairman and its Executive Committee so that the business sessions of the association may be as brief as possible.

III. Officers.

A. Executive Committee

- 1. The Executive Committee shall be considered the officers of the association.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of not more than six members of the association elected from year to year by the association.

- 3. At the first election, two members shall be elected for one year, two for two years, and two for three years. Thereafter two members shall be elected annually to fulfill three-year terms. Midterm vacancies shall be filled by the remaining members of the Executive Committee.
- 4. In elections, nominees shall be chosen by the Executive Committee and presented in a mailing to the membership of the association, allowing ample time in advance of the next meeting of the association. Any member of the association has the privilege of adding a write-in candidate on the ballot.
- 5. The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the association.
- B. <u>Chairman of the Executive Committee</u>. The Executive Committee shall elect a Chairman from among its members.
- C. <u>Vice-Chairman of the Executive Committee</u>. The Executive Committee shall elect a Vice-Chairman from among its members to serve in the absence of the Chairman, in his inability to act, or in the event of his decision not to exercise his power of appointment.
- D: Secretary-Treasurer. The Executive Committee shall elect a Secretary-Treasurer (or a Secretary and a Treasurer) either from among its members or from outside the Executive Committee. If this officer(s) is elected from outside the Executive Committee he/she will be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the records of the association and have charge of its funds. If the office is divided between a Secretary and a Treasurer, the Executive Committee will determine their respective duties.
- E. <u>Addresser</u>. The Addresser shall be the speaker selected by the Executive Committee.

- IV. Membership. The membership of the association shall consist of those who have received Primary class instruction in Christian Science from John Doe, C.S.B. A member unable to receive mail, or from whom there has been no communication for several years, may be placed on "inactive status" by the Executive Committee. A member wishing to withdraw from the association should have his name removed from current membership records. The association historical records will always show that the individual was class taught by the teacher, and therefore is not eligible to be taught by another Christian Science teacher.
- V. <u>Funds</u>. The annual dues shall be a minimum of \$___ for each member. These should be mailed to the Secretary-Treasurer at the beginning of each calendar year. Contributions to the association and to its various funds may be made at any time. As a general rule, the association should make a gift to The Mother Church each year. At such time that the majority of the membership deems it appropriate to disband the association, all of the funds and property of the association shall be distributed to the General Fund of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, for the promotion and extension of Christian Science as taught by Mary Baker Eddy.
- VI. <u>Meetings</u>. The association shall meet once each year for not more than one day. The date and place of the meeting and the invitation of visitors shall be determined by the Executive Committee from year to year.
- VII. Amendment to Bylaws. The bylaws of the association may be amended by vote of the association with a minimum of 45 days written notice and an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the association voting thereon, by mail prior to such annual meeting, or by vote at the business session of the annual meeting. Copies of any adopted amendment shall be furnished to members promptly.

SPEAKER FEES

Speakers are generally reimbursed for the cost of their travel and accommodation expenses incurred for addressing an association. <u>In addition</u> a fee is given as a token of appreciation for preparing and giving the address itself.

Due to respect for confidentiality between speakers and associations, and due to the variety of extenuating circumstances, there is no accurate way of assessing an appropriate average, or minimum, fee. Consideration on both the part of the association and the part of the speaker, will lead to an agreed upon figure.

The following are some points to consider:

- Appreciation of the time, effort and dedication of the speaker;
- Annual commitment of the speaker to one association;
- Inflation from year to year;
- Financial assets of the association.

In some countries, specifically the United States, the fee is considered taxable income and appropriate tax forms need to be given to the speaker and filed with the Internal Revenue Service.

ELIGIBLE TO ATTEND

As members of one association of a teacher's pupils, an individual is called to an association meeting once a year. In extenuating circumstances, when it is not practical for one to attend one's own association, or when one's own association has been disbanded, that individual is eligible under Article XXVI, Section 7, to attend by invitation, another association.

Invitations to visitors should be extended only on an individual basis to those who make formal request. It is optional with each executive committee whether or not to admit visitors. Only pupils of loyal teachers may be invited to an association meeting. Persons whose teacher in on probation are <u>not</u> eligible to attend.

It is frequently considered that the following circumstances justify attendance at more than one association a year:

- One who addresses an association of which he or she is not a member is free to attend his or her own association as well;
- One who addresses the association of which he or she is a member, is eligible to request an invitation to attend another association as a guest;
- The spouse of a speaker is free to attend his or her own association and, if invited, the one addressed by his or her spouse;
- A teacher is not free to attend an association of the pupils of another teacher, even if his or her spouse is addressing it as guest speaker.

INFORMATION FOR CHRISTIAN SCIENCE PUPILS ASSOCIATIONS REGARDING OBLIGATIONS UNDER FEDERAL INCOME TAX AND SOCIAL SECURITY WITHHOLDING LAWS

A. SECRETARY AND TREASURER

Although many associations feel that the amount given yearly to a secretary or a treasurer is an "honorarium" or "stipend", the IRS would view any amount to be compensation for services.

Consequently, secretaries and treasurers of associations are to be classified as employees, and the following guidelines apply:

Federal Income Tax Withholding – Withholding of federal income taxes must be made from payments to employees who earn sufficiently large salaries. The withholding tables prepared by the Internal Revenue Service provide that no withholding is required to be made from the salary paid to a single employee if she or he is paid less than \$105.00 per week or \$210.00 biweekly or \$230.00 semimonthly or \$460.00 monthly and claims one withholding allowance. In the case of a married employee claiming one withholding allowance, no withholding is required if the payment is less than \$180.00 per week or \$360.00 biweekly or \$390.00 semi-monthly or \$760.00 monthly. Even if no withholding is required, however, employees must report the compensation received on their own income tax returns. You should refer to IRS Publication 15 (Circular E, Employer's Tax Guide) for all the applicable withholding tables.

<u>Social Security Taxes</u> – Associations must withhold and pay social security taxes (including Medicare) from the wages of an employee who earns \$100 or more during the year. In addition, the association must contribute an equal amount on behalf of the employee for each year.

Required Forms – On or before January 31 of each year, associations must furnish a Form W-2 to each employee from who wages income tax and/or social security tax has been withheld. A copy of each W-2 must be furnished to the IRS using transmittal form W-3. In addition, associations must file with the Internal Revenue Service a quarterly Form 941 showing the amount of social security tax paid during the quarter and also, showing any income tax withheld during the quarter.

2. <u>Independent Contractors</u> – If an individual is considered an independent contractor of the association, the following guidelines apply:

<u>Taxes</u> - Neither income tax nor social security tax should be withheld from the compensation paid to an independent contractor.

Required Forms – Although no W-2 form needs to be completed with respect to an independent contractor, the association is required to provide each independent contractor with Form 1099-MISC on or before January 31 if the individual is paid \$600 or more during the calendar year. A copy of each 1099-MISC must be forwarded to the IRS using transmittal form 1096.

B. TEACHER

Although many associations feel that the amount given yearly to their teacher is a gift, the IRS would view any amount to be compensation for services. Because the association does not direct the teacher in his or her work for the association, he or she is generally considered an independent contractor of the association.

Since the teacher is considered an independent contractor, the association need not withhold federal income taxes or social security taxes from the teacher's compensation. Although no W-2 form needs to be completed with respect to the teacher, the association is required to provide the teacher with a Form 1099-MISC if he or she is paid \$600 or more during the calendar year. A copy of this 1099-MISC must also be submitted to the IRS, using transmittal form 1096.

C .SPEAKER

- 1. <u>Independent Contractor Status</u> The Individual who is invited to give the association day address, in lieu of the teacher, should be considered an independent contractor of the association.
- 2. Speakers Who Are U. S. Citizens As with the teacher, the association need not withhold federal income taxes or social security taxes from the compensation paid to the speaker. Although no W-2 form needs to be completed with respect to a speaker, the association is required to provide the speaker with Form 1099-MISC if he or she is paid \$600 or more during the calendar year, and to send a copy of the 1099 to the IRS using Form 1096.
- 3. <u>Speakers Who Are Nonresident Aliens</u> Special rules apply to foreign speakers. An association which is considering the possibility of inviting a nonresident

alien to be their speaker can obtain relevant tax and immigration information from the Office of the General Counsel.

D. TEACHER/SPEAKER EXEMPTION FROM SOCIAL SECURITY TAX

Compensation received by the teacher or speaker from the association should be treated the same as practitioner income. Consequently, if the teacher or speaker has claimed exemption from self-employment tax by filing Form 4361 with the Internal Revenue Service, he or she may claim this income, along with other practitioner income, as exempt from self-employment tax on his or her income tax return. The association, however, is still required to file Form 1099-MISC when compensation of \$600 or more has been paid during the calendar year, regardless of whether or not the teacher/speaker has filed Form 4361.

UNITED STATES INCOME TAX INFORMATION

In the United States the Internal Revenue Service has ruled that Christian Science Pupils' Associations are integral activities of The Mother Church under the By-Laws of The First Church of Christ, Scientist, Boston, Massachusetts, and thus are exempt from US income tax. Contribution, dues, legacies and bequests to associations are deductible for income, gift, and estate tax purposes as provided in the various sections of the Internal Revenue Code.

While a Christian Science Pupils' Association is exempt from reporting its income to the IRS, it is not exempt from Federal income tax withholding obligations as an employer.

Identification Number (FEIN)

Every Christian Science Association of Pupils must have its own Federal Employer Identification Number (EIN). It is no longer legitimate for associations to use The Mother Church's EIN. The association's EIN is to be provided to a bank or other financial institution which holds the association accounts. It is also the number which the association uses to report to the IRS any wages paid to, or withholdings of tax collected from, association employees. Personal Social Security numbers should not be used on association accounts, because those individuals whose numbers are used would be personally responsible for reporting any income from association accounts as their own. (See "Information for Christian Science Pupils' Association Obligations under Federal Income Tax and Social Security Withholding Laws" for more information regarding compensation paid by the association to its secretary, treasurer, or other persons).

If your association does not already have a Federal EIN, information and Application Form SS-4 can be obtained from the Office of the General Counsel at The Mother Church (See page 2). The IRS requires that The Mother Church maintain a list of EINs for associations. If your number has not already been shared with us, please call the Board of Education or the Office of the General Counsel and give us the number for our records.

Tax Exempt Status

It is sometimes mistakenly thought that the EIN indicates tax exempt status, but the number itself is not determinative of tax exempt status. An association derives its tax-exempt status from being an "integral activity" of The Mother Church. It may also be helpful to note that The Mother Church and Christian Science Pupil's Associations are exempt from Federal income tax under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code

In addition to the exemption from federal income taxation, in many states associations are exempt from the payment of sales tax which applies to an association's purchases of various items or goods for religious purposes and activities. The Federal EIN is <u>not</u> related to sales tax exemption. Sales tax exemption is distinct from the Federal income tax exemption and must be applied for in each state where purchases are made.

For official verification of Federal Income Tax status, if needed, contact the Board of Education.

Tax Withholding

The pages entitled "Information for Christian Science Pupils' Associations Regarding Obligations under Federal Income Tax and Social Security Withholding Laws" contains procedures which the association will need to follow when compensating individuals for services performed. While it is often thought that compensation for services can take the form of a "gift," "honorarium" or "stipend," the IRS views any kind of compensation for services as reportable, taxable income. The tax withholding guideline is updated yearly by the General Counsel's Office and is always available on request.

As general information, the 1099 Form is for reporting speaker fees and other one-time payments for services rendered. The W-2 Form is for those who are considered employees by receiving regular payment on a continuing basis. Record of all payments must be kept by the association.

Gifts and Endowments

Contributions, dues, gifts, legacies, bequests, and devises to associations are deductible for income, gift and estate tax purposes as provided in the various sections of the Internal Revenue Code.

Donations of \$250 or more in a single gift must be formally acknowledged in a receipt given to the donor in substantially the following form:

Deductions

The expenses of attending association meetings cannot be deducted as a charitable contribution to a religious organization. However, *Journal*-advertising practitioners may deduct, as a business expense, transportation and other expenses incurred in attending association meetings.

From The Manual of The Mother Church:

Article XXVI "Care of Pupils." Sect. 2... A teacher shall not assume personal control of, or attempt to dominate his pupils, but he shall hold himself morally obligated to promote their progress in the understanding of divine Principle, not only during the class term but after it, and to watch well that they prove sound in sentiment and practical in Christian Science. He shall persistently and patiently counsel his pupils in conformity with the unerring laws of God, and shall enjoin them habitually to study the Scriptures and SCIENCE AND HEALTH WITH KEY TO THE SCRIPTURES as a help thereto." (p. 83:11)

Article XXVI "Associations. Sect. 6. The associations of the pupils of loyal teachers shall convene annually..." (p. 84:16-18)

Article XXVII "Without Teachers. Sect. 2. Those beloved brethren whose teacher has left them, can elect an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association." (p. 86:9)

Article XXX "Healing Better than Teaching. Sect. 7. Healing the sick and the sinner with Truth demonstrates what we affirm of Christian Science, and nothing can substitute this demonstration. I recommend that each member of this Church shall strive to demonstrate by his or her practice, that Christian Science heals the sick quickly and wholly, thus proving this Science to be all that we claim for it..." (p. 92:3-11)

We're confident that your association, even without your well-loved teacher, must continue to progress as a crucial part of Mary Baker Eddy's design for her Church and its mission of healing and saving the world. And what an opportunity for spiritual growth the members of your association now have--of comforting each other and rising "in the strength of Spirit" to fulfill the role Mrs. Eddy envisioned for each association as a mighty force for good in the world! (*Science and Health*, p. 393:12-13) Individually and collectively, you will all work and pray, perhaps as never before, to *live* the precious Science of Christ your dear teacher taught and demonstrated so selflessly. Your class teaching has prepared you. The great Shepherd is at your side. And as Mary Baker Eddy wrote in a "Message to The Mother Church," "Your dual and impersonal pastor, the Bible and 'Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures,' is with you; and the Life these give, the Truth they illustrate, the Love they demonstrate, is the great Shepherd that feedeth my flock, and leadeth them 'beside the still waters.'" (*Miscellaneous Writings*, p. 322:10-15)

The Board of Education is eager to embrace and assist associations without teachers in any way we can! In order to do this, it's important to stay in touch. So please do keep us informed of the name, address, phone number and email of the current Secretary, and let us know promptly when changes occur in any of these, so we can be sure that all communications reach you promptly.

If your association has bylaws, or if your teacher has provided specific instructions for you to follow, these will be most helpful to you. And of course, your prayer and spiritual intuition will be an ongoing guide as you move forward step by step, as active healers serving the Cause of Christian Science. Feel free, however, to be in touch with the Board of Education office at any point if you have questions.

We have included in these guidelines information that we hope you'll find useful. But please know that these points are suggestions only--and should not supersede the association bylaws or directives from your teacher.

OFFICERS AND EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

When the teacher is no longer present, and the executive committee (made up of members of the association normally serving without compensation) is carrying forward the association's activities, it's important that the association be democratic enough to get the full benefit of its members' ideas, inspiration and prayer.

The experiences of associations without teachers show the wisdom of having officers and members of the executive committee elected by the membership as a whole for the purpose of deciding important questions. And it's usually helpful to learn the wishes of the membership by mail or an online ballot, rather than by extensive debate and balloting at the association meeting. If at any time your association discusses disbanding, we recommend writing the Board of Education for a Handout on this subject.

Each association is, of course, free to establish its own procedures, but many find it useful to establish a three-year term of office for executive committee members. Sometimes the Secretary and Treasurer serve as members of the executive committee; sometimes they do not. But in either case their terms are not necessarily governed by a three-year rotation-in-office rule. Associations have generally found it important, however, to take care that no individual begins to feel that he or she is "in charge" of the association or assumes the role of a teacher. While it is helpful to have a Secretary and Treasurer (often the same individual) who are experienced in the work, these positions are not usually considered perpetual. Both the Secretary and Treasurer report to the executive committee, and it's important to have it clearly understood that the executive committee has ultimate responsibility for conducting the affairs of the association.

Usually executive committees elect from among their members each year someone to serve a Chair and Vice-Chair.

BYLAWS

In cases where neither bylaws nor directives have been provided by the teacher, association executive committees are encouraged to draw up a set of bylaws as soon as possible for consideration and ratification by the association membership as a whole.

In preparing bylaws, associations generally follow parliamentary procedures, insofar as these support the purpose and activities of the association.

A sample set of bylaws follows, which your association may wish to adopt, adapt, or use as a model if you are writing your own bylaws.

If your teacher provided a set of bylaws you may wish to reconsider them, from time to time, making changes as needed.

Sample BYLAWS

The Christian Science Association of the Pupils of John Doe, C.S.B.

- I. Authority for Organization. This association, The Christian Science Association of the Pupils of John Doe, C.S.B., is organized under the authority of Article XXVI, Section 6, of the *Manual of The Mother Church*, by Mary Baker Eddy.
- II. **Purpose.** The purpose of this association is to further the teachings of Christian Science as set forth in the writings of Mary Baker Eddy and specifically in the *Church Manual*. Its purpose is not the exercise of parliamentary democracy, but rather is completely religious in character. For this reason the business of the association will be conducted as far as possible by its Chairman and its Executive Committee so that the business sessions of the association may be as brief as possible.

III. Officers.

A. Executive Committee

- 1. The Executive Committee shall be considered the officers of the association.
- 2. The Executive Committee shall consist of not more than six members of the association elected from year to year by the association.
- 3. At the first election, two members shall be elected for one year, two for two years, and two for three years. Thereafter two members shall be elected annually to fulfill three-year terms. Midterm vacancies shall be filled by the remaining members of the Executive Committee.
- 4. In elections, nominees shall be chosen by the Executive Committee and presented in a mailing to the membership of the association, allowing ample time in advance of the next meeting of the association. Any member of the association has the privilege of adding a write-in candidate on the ballot.
- 5. The Executive Committee shall conduct the business of the association.

- B. Chair of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall elect a Chair from among its members.
- C. Vice-Chair of the Executive Committee. The Executive Committee shall elect a Vice-Chair from among its members to serve in the absence of the Chair, in his/her inability to act, or in the event of his/her decision not to exercise his/her power of appointment.
- D. Secretary-Treasurer. The Executive Committee shall elect a Secretary-Treasurer (or a Secretary and a Treasurer) either from among its members or from outside the Executive Committee. If this officer(s) is elected from outside the Executive Committee he/she will be a non-voting member of the Executive Committee. The Secretary-Treasurer shall keep the records of the association and have charge of its funds. If the office is divided between a Secretary and a Treasurer, the Executive Committee will determine their respective duties.
- 1. Addresser. The Addresser shall be the speaker selected by the Executive Committee.
- IV. Membership. The membership of the association shall consist of those who have received Primary class instruction in Christian Science from John Doe, C.S.B. A member unable to receive mail, or from whom there has been no communication for several years, may be placed on "inactive status" by the Executive Committee. A member wishing to withdraw from the association should have his name removed from current membership records. The association historical records will always show that the individual was class taught by the teacher, and therefore is not eligible to be taught by another Christian Science teacher.
- V. Funds. The annual dues shall be a minimum of \$____ for each member. These should be mailed to the Secretary-Treasurer at the beginning of each calendar year. Contributions to the association and to its various funds may be made at any time. [Possible language: "As a general rule, the association should make a gift to The Mother Church each year."] At such time that the majority of the membership deems it appropriate to disband the association, all of the funds and property of the association shall be distributed to [Possible language: "the General Fund of The Mother Church, The First Church of Christ, Scientist, in Boston, Massachusetts, for the promotion and extension of Christian Science as taught by Mary Baker Eddy."] It is the association's intent for funds or other property given to the association after the association has disbanded and dissolved (e.g., a later estate gift) to be distributed to this same recipient for the same purpose.
- VI. Meetings. The association shall meet once each year for not more than one day. The date and place of the meeting and the invitation of visitors shall be determined by the Executive Committee from year to year.
- VII. Amendment to Bylaws. The bylaws of the association may be amended by vote of the association with a minimum of 45 days written notice and an affirmative vote of two-thirds of the members of the association voting thereon, by mail prior to such annual meeting, or by vote at the business session of the annual meeting. Copies of any adopted amendment shall be furnished to members promptly.

ASSOCIATION MEETINGS and GUEST SPEAKERS

CHURCH MANUAL BYLAW

Article XXVI "Without Teachers. Sect. 2. Those beloved brethren, whose teacher has left them, can elect an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association." (page 86:9)

An association is so much more than an inspiring day-long talk by an experienced Christian Scientist, however important and wonderfully enriching that meeting may be.

An association is a unique family of students of Christian Science taught by a specific teacher. Fellow association members normally work together on year-long healing goals, often inspired by a study assignment given by the guest speaker, or association executive committee. And they look forward joyfully to sharing with each other at their annual meeting the healing fruits of their association's special metaphysical goals.

Association day provides a place of fellowship to gather the rich harvest of healings and spiritual progress by fellow Christian Scientists. It is also a time of encouragement for each other in their spiritual journeys as they heal current challenges and set new spiritual goals for the future. In this way students in the association extend to each other the kind of shepherding "care of pupils" their teacher always provided for them (See Article XXVI, "Care of Pupils." Sect. 2, p. 83).

So one can certainly understand why Mary Baker Eddy felt such a gathering should meet just once each year--and why members would participate in only one such family gather yearly. Each association around the world makes its own vital unique contribution toward fulfilling the mission Mrs. Eddy envisioned for the Cause of Christian Science in this age.

SELECTING A GUEST SPEAKER

Responsibility of executive committee and membership

It's the demonstration of each association without a teacher to prayerfully choose and invite a speaker to conduct their annual association meeting in accordance with the *Manual*, Article XXVII, Section 2.

Only pupils of loyal teachers may address an association. A speaker does not hold any permanent standing in the association, although the same person may be invited to address an association more than once.

Selecting the speaker to address the annual association meeting in any particular year is not solely the responsibility of the executive committee. The whole association can be invited, year by year, to prayerfully support this selection process. It then clearly becomes the demonstration of the entire association, reflecting their joy and commitment to the Cause of Christian Science.

Questions you may want to consider in the selection process:

- -- What is the purpose of our association meeting?
- --What qualities and qualifications do we feel are most needed in the association speaker?

At the top of many such lists of qualities are spirituality, an inspired understanding of Christian Science, the proven ability to demonstrate Christian Science as a healer, and the ability to effectively communicate Christian Science.

You might also ask if the person has:

- -- An effective public healing practice;
- -- A strong record of branch church activity;
- --Articles published in the Christian Science periodicals;
- --Effective work as a lecturer, Committee on Publication, or in some other activity of The Mother Church.

As you begin to see what is important to you as an association, the question then becomes: What person, whether well-known or not, will best meet the need of our association on that special day?

Initially contacting the prospective speaker

You may want to send a simple application to the prospective speaker to find out details that your executive committee deems helpful. (See attached sample)

As you get to know the person you're considering as an association speaker, you may find it helpful to discuss questions like the following:

- --Are they class taught by a loyal teacher of Christian Science?
- --Is the prospective speaker free of private theories and interpretations of Mrs. Eddy's writings?
- -- Do they support all provisions in the *Manual of The Mother Church*?
- -- Do they express themselves clearly?

Each association will find its own way of selecting a speaker. Sometimes a committee will search for a speaker first from within their own association membership. Some associations require that, if possible, at least one member of the committee has firsthand knowledge about a speaker. Association members may suggest names of prospective speakers, but the executive committee usually accepts responsibility for obtaining pertinent information about possible

speakers and makes the final decision. Often a committee will interview a perspective speaker by phone, or in person.

The Mother Church does not maintain a list of names, nor does it recommend prospective speakers. The Board of Education may, however, be able to help an association gather information about a speaker they are considering.

Inviting the speaker

Normally associations invite a speaker more than a year in advance of the date of the meeting in order to give them a full year for preparation of the address and for mentoring association members individually in their healing practice.

When inviting a speaker, the committee will want to share some information about the association. That will help that individual know whether or not it feels right to accept. Addressing the association should be a demonstration for both speaker and association.

The speaker will also need to be briefed on the agenda for the association day--what time will be available for the address, the length of the business meeting, the time allowed for lunch, the opportunity for interactive discussion among the members, testimonies from members, and so on.

It's also thoughtful to share what fee is usually provided, as well as what hotel and travel expenses are paid by the association.

It might also be worthwhile to mention to the speaker that the Board of Education can provide them with helpful guidelines and other information for people addressing associations.

Speakers address one association annually

Article XXVII, Section 2, of the *Church Manual* provides for an experienced Christian Scientist to conduct the meetings of an association whose teacher has left them.

Speakers may address only one association per year. An association meeting involves much more than a one-day event. For both teacher and students, the annual meeting is the culmination of a year of study and spiritual growth. It represents the tender, day-by-day, year-by-year "care of pupils" by a teacher, and the ongoing response to that care by the pupils. When the teacher is no longer present, there is the *Manual* provision for electing "... an experienced Christian Scientist, who is not in charge of an association of students and who is ready for this high calling, to conduct the meetings of their association." The members of the association can expect that the individual they elect is devoting a full measure of love, prayer, research and preparation to addressing their specific needs and supporting their spiritual growth for that year. Having

made this commitment to an association of pupils for a given year, a speaker would not want to divert his/her shepherding and mentoring attention to caring for other associations as well. (See *Manual*, Article XXVI, Sections 2 and 6, and Article XXVII, Section 2). Therefore if a speaker is already in charge of one association, he or she is not eligible to accept another invitation.

THE ASSOCIATION ADDRESS

Purpose of the address

"Associations. Sect. 6. The associations of the pupils of a loyal teacher shall convene annually. The pupils shall be guided by the BIBLE, and SCIENCE AND HEALTH, not by their teachers' personal views. Teachers shall not call their pupils together, or assemble a selected number of them, for more frequent meetings" (Church Manual, p. 84)

After their teacher has left them, associations continue the practice of calling their membership together for an annual gathering by inviting a guest speaker to conduct their association meeting. Or sometimes the guest speaker duties may be shared among the association members themselves. But whatever the format, in an address prepared for the specific occasion and association audience, the speaker turns the students to the guidance of the Bible and *Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures*, as the teacher always did. The address explores clearly and convincingly how the fundamental truths of Christian Science apply to today's needs—for the individual, our Church, and humanity.

This metaphysical address is the main reason for bringing the members of the association together each year, and it should occupy the major portion of the day. Speakers and association members may find, however, that some interactive approaches (occasional small discussion groups, question-and-answer periods, or testimonies of healing given by members) will enrich and help illustrate the major points in the speaker's address. It will also provide an opportunity for the mutual support and tender shepherding association members provide for each other. Progress and healing is the norm for all association day gatherings.

The executive committee's responsibility

When the teacher is no longer conducting the association, it becomes the executive committee's responsibility to maintain a standard for the one who addresses the association as guest speaker. This standard is of course put forward by Mrs. Eddy in the above quoted bylaw. The committee takes the initiative to specify the number of hours reserved for the address, and to help the guest speaker understand that the association attendees look forward to a message that inspires and nurtures the spiritual growth of each member, and is free of "personal views." The committee will want to give the speaker keen and appreciative support, assuring him or her that they are prayerfully supporting a harmonious and receptive atmosphere as the address unfolds on the association meeting day.

ASSOCIATION ADDRESS GUIDELINES

Mary Baker Eddy's *Manual* bylaw "Healing Better than Teaching" (Article XXX, Sect. 7, page 92) sets the tone and goal for each association address.

"Healing the sick and the sinner with Truth demonstrates what we affirm of Christian Science, and nothing can substitute this demonstration. I recommend that each member of this Church shall strive to demonstrate by his or her practice that Christian Science heals the sick quickly and wholly, thus proving this Science to be all that we claim for it."

Our individual efforts to make the theology of Christian Science practical--striving for quicker and more clear-cut healing--not only establish the health of our Church but help answer humanity's urgent cry for hope and help. So the association speaker has the special opportunity and privilege to both minister to the individual spiritual needs of each member and guest, and at the same time to inspire in them a desire to help meet humanity's needs through the public practice of Christian Science.

Here are some basic characteristics that are usually common to the most helpful association addresses:

1. Basic Christian Science metaphysics

The address will naturally inspire and challenge students to grow in their understanding of God, man, Christ, and divine Science. Of course, each address will look at these subjects from a different perspective, usually developing a central theme that ties them all together. But this theme is always subsidiary to the fundamental metaphysical laws of God it illustrates.

Mary Baker Eddy writes in *Science and Health*, "We know no more of man as the true divine image and likeness, than we know of God" (page 258:16)

In a sense, therefore, the primary subject of an association address will center around God--as our divine Father-Mother is experienced day by day in ways that bring healing and regeneration to humanity. This will naturally include a sense of newness, fresh views and inspiring discoveries about the synonyms for God, God's creation, God's universe, God's man--all of which will be supported by passages drawn from the Pastor. And it will convey the joy of seeing eternal Truth ever unfolding and stirring thought to see the fundamental truths of Christian Science in new applications and fresh perspectives.

The speaker will also want to offer a vivid sense of the Christ and its healing activity, as well as a deep appreciation of Christ Jesus, the great Exemplar for Christian healers.

2. Practice, healing and treatment

Each association meeting provides an opportunity to review the basic elements of Christian Science treatment, including the application of the truths of God, man and the universe to specific human needs. Since the healing practice is the ultimate goal of class teaching, every

association address will seek to nurture the Christliness of each listener as the best preparation for public practice. And of course, the speaker, as well as testimonies contributed by attendees, will shed light on a number of practical questions concerning the practice.

3. Handling animal magnetism

The claims of animal magnetism, especially those that seem to be active within society today, need to be exposed and vigorously handled, from the standpoint of God's allness and omnipotence. The address will encourage students to nurture the purity of thought that overcomes erroneous patterns of thought claiming to be part of human nature. All of this is consistent with our Leader's statement that "the higher mission of the Christ-power...[is] to take away the sins of the world" (Science and Health, page 150).

4. Daily prayer for oneself

The address provides an opportunity to remind students of the need for regular daily prayer for themselves, as well as their home and family. This includes setting aside quiet time for daily study of the Pastor (the Bible and Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures), combined with prayer for one's own spiritual growth, all of which prepares the student to contribute actively to the healing mission of our Church.

5. Love for Church

The address can foster a fresh, vibrant sense of Church with all its possibilities for progress and growth, promoting prayerful and practical support of both branch church activities and The Mother Church. It might also touch on the latest steps being taken by branch churches, as well as The Mother Church, to "reinstate primitive Christianity and its lost element of healing" (Manual, p. 17). This discussion might highlight, for instance, the online presence of The Mother Church and its periodicals, and be tied in with the provisions in the Church Manual, showing how these are adequate to take care of all present and future needs of our Church.

6. Prayer for the world

Speakers will also want to touch on community, national, and world challenges, as well as the opportunity and selfless responsibility of Christian Scientists to pray for resolution of them. This discussion can perhaps provide a wonderful opportunity to focus on the healing purpose of *The Christian Science Monitor* and its mission "to injure no man, but to bless all mankind" (*First Church and Miscellany*, page 353).

7. Mary Baker Eddy

"To misunderstand Paul, was to be ignorant of the divine idea he taught," Mrs. Eddy writes. "Ignorance of the divine idea betrays at once a greater ignorance of the divine Principle of the idea--ignorance of Truth and Love" (Science and Health, page 560-561).

Specific and meaningful references to our Leader in the address will help rekindle the members' appreciation of Mary Baker Eddy, and shelter them from "ignorance of the divine Principle." Inspiring new reference material can be found in the many biographies and extended reminiscences of our Leader now available in Reading Rooms around the world. The address also offers an avenue for helping students grasp Mrs. Eddy's role in revealing the Comforter Jesus promised he would send--and for understanding her work as Discoverer, Founder, Leader and "a scribe under orders" (Miscellaneous Writings, p. 311:26).

8. Research on Mary Baker Eddy

The speaker will want to take care in sharing quotations by or about our Leader. Occasionally, statements and manuscripts incorrectly attributed to Mrs. Eddy are circulated, and some of these are said to have come from association addresses or meetings. We suggest that quotations and anecdotes related to our Leader be authenticated by the Research staff of The Mary Baker Eddy Library. The staff may be reached at 617-450-7218 or research@mbelibrary.org. They are also happy to assist with historical questions related to Mrs. Eddy or the Christian Science Church.

SPEAKER FEES

Speakers are generally reimbursed for the cost of the travel and accommodation expenses incurred in addressing an association. *In addition* a fee is given to the speaker as a token of appreciation for preparing and giving the address itself.

Because of the confidentiality between speakers and associations, as well as the variety of surrounding circumstances, there is no accurate way of assessing an appropriate average, or minimum fee. Prayerful consideration on the part of both the association and the speaker, will lead to an agreed-upon figure.

The following are some points to consider:

- --Appreciation of the time, effort and dedication of the speaker;
- -- Commitment of the speaker to one association annually;
- --Inflation from year to year;
- -- Financial assets of the association.

In some countries, specifically the United States, the fee is considered taxable income, and appropriate tax forms need to be given to the speaker and filed with the Internal Revenue Service.

ACTION - Motion carried to keep the asset allocation of our Trust as it is -- 25% in stock fund, 75% in bond fund.

Committee concurred in approving draft of letter to non-attendees.

We have been weighing Mr. Bowles' instructions to us, through our association bylaws and through memoranda left to the Executive Committee, as they concern our duty to select only qualified speakers to address our association; and we have been weighing our duty to speak truthfully in our letter to the Board of Directors of The Mother Church.

As concerns selecting qualified speakers, in our bylaws Mr. Bowles instructs the Executive Committee that "They shall carefully inquire into the qualifications of available addressers for the association meetings, and shall elect yearly one, well qualified, to address the association." In an August 23rd, 1982, memorandum to the Executive Committee, he says, "great care should be exercised in inquiring into the qualifications of the prospective speaker." And on July 28, 1982, he notes, "No one is to address the Association at any time who has in his or her background the false teaching (promoted by the Bliss Knapp group) that Mrs. Eddy is the woman of the Apocalypse."

In obedience to these requirements, each prospective speaker this year has been questioned more fully than in the past. From The Mother Church's "GUIDELINES FOR CHRISTIAN SCIENCE STUDENTS ASSOCIATIONS" we have prepared these four questions:

1. Please give the names of your primary class teacher, and his/her

primary and normal class teachers.

2. What is your experience in effective healing work in the public practice? Also please list any articles published as well as your branch church and Mother Church activities.

3. Do you fully support all Manual provisions?

4. Are you free from private theories and interpretations of Mrs. Eddy's writings?

And based on the decision of your Executive Committee, we ask the following two additional questions:

5. Are you free from the false teaching that Mrs. Eddy is the woman of

the Apocalypse?

6. Mr. Bowles was very specific in his teaching on prayer and Christian Science treatment. Please write an example of your approach to daily metaphysical prayer for yourself or give us some insight as to your own understanding of prayer and Christian Science treatment.

These questions and the responses we have received have been very helpful in gaining some insight into each prospective speaker's thinking and his or her approach which might be taken in addressing our association, thus enabling us to make an informed decision.

ASSOCIATION OF PUPILS OF NEIL H. BOWLES, C.S.B. Letter to the Association Members

As concerns our annual letter to the Board of Directors, our bylaws refer the members to keeping "human will out of the way" and realizing "that the only purpose of this association is to provide spiritual growth for them", closing with, "Remember, you are always peacemakers." And in addition to Mr. Bowles' memorandum concerning "the false teaching (promoted by the Bliss Knapp group)", Mr. Bowles writes in an August 26th, 1958, letter to the Board of Directors of The Mother Church from our association, "Inclosed is the annual letter to your Board from my Association of Students, together with a check of \$500.00 as an expression of love and loyalty for The Mother Church." (emphasis added).

As your Executive Committee we feel strongly, as we know Mr. Bowles would have felt, that the Knapp book should be withdrawn from publication and its incorrect teaching disavowed. With the duty of writing our letter to the Board of Directors of The Mother Church we stand forewarned of those who "tacitly assent where they should dissent" (Mis.109:3). Would we be guilty of this if we left unvoiced the call to protect and defend the pure teaching of Mrs. Eddy and her faithful followers from the false teaching promoted by the Bliss Knapp group? We believe a position fully supportive of the Board and their actions would not be truthful, but a false sense of peace.

To these issues we are enclosing a letter written by your Executive Committee as this year's letter to the Board of Directors. We are asking for your prayerful consideration and vote on this letter. Please all respond to this letter, returning your vote, and if you wish your comments as well, in the enclosed envelope before September 1. If the association gives its support, then the letter will be sent on Association Day with no vote or discussion required. Otherwise a Letter Writing Committee will be appointed and their letter presented at Association Day for your acceptance.

Certainly Mr. Bowles would have responded to this issue through his unfoldment as a member of The Mother Church seeking to obey the Manual. This same avenue remains open for each one of us. We feel also that he would have made a strong plea to his students to work to resolve this through individual prayer as he has taught us to do. If each of us in this association alone were to do daily metaphysical work for the healing of this situation, would it not be enough to bring a quick and harmonious solution? We must believe that it would.

In our bylaws Mr. Bowles speaks of this association, "Thus is the prosperity of the Cause promoted through this department of its Christianly scientific educational system."

We wish to extend an heartfelt request and invitation to each one of you, as members of this association, to make every possible effort to attend our association meeting and to hear our speaker's address each year, knowing that in so doing you will be protecting and fostering your "spiritual growth" and "spiritual welfare" within this "Christianly scientific educational system" Mr. Bowles so dearly desired for each one of us.

Please be reminded of our bylaw, that "members shall always hold as strictly confidential the letters...and the affairs of the association."

We are looking forward to a richly rewarding and healing meeting this October 16th, 1993, knowing as always - "And they shall be all taught of God." (John 6:45)

Dear Friends:

Our association has just gathered for the 43rd consecutive year, and once again we have been well fed. It's a joy to participate expectantly and progressively in our Leader's system of spiritual education.

Your letter of January 1993 was read, and we thank you for it. We join you in reaching out to the "next towns," in proving that the blessings of the Comforter are not just for a privileged few, but are for all. Mrs. Eddy's words about the work of Jesus apply equally to our own:

It is not well to imagine that Jesus demonstrated the divine power to heal only for a select number or for a limited period of time, since to all mankind and in every hour, divine Love supplies all good. (Science and Health, p.494)

Even so, we cannot overlook the need for healing within our own ranks. The challenges of the last several years continue to demand our best prayers and work for our church.

Our teacher, Neil H. Bowles, served the Cause of Christian Science faithfully and well for many years. He was well known for his integrity, his deep love for our Leader, and his fidelity to her teachings. He was also an earnest student of the Church Manual; his personal library included dozens of copies, most of which were marked, dog-eared, and well-thumbed.

In an article entitled "The Manual: Staff and Rod," published in The Christian Science Journal (June 1977), Mr. Bowles wrote:

...the Manual authorizes the publications of this Church and insists on their integrity. Published statements that depart from the pure metaphysics of the revelation of Christian Science could produce division and be injurious to our Cause. Where there is obedience to the Manual, this can never happen.

Mr. Bowles' teaching about our Leader was strictly obedient to the <u>Manual</u> and was drawn directly from her writings. It included no mysticism or personal interpretations. It emphatically refuted many of the claims made in <u>Destiny</u>.

A lengthy discussion followed, with questions and answers.

Since John Fletcher had offered to drive them back to their respective hotels. Mrs. Scaldini and Mr. Carr excused themselves for a short while so that the Committee could confer privately. However, the Committee felt they needed more time to study the charts and think about this. They were not ready to make the decision. Therefore John Fletcher and our visitors left, and the other Committee members concurred that the Committee should meet again on Thursday, March 3, at 7 PM in the Board Room of Second Church, to decide this matter as well as the reinvestment of our local CDs which are maturing presently.

Since there has been some concern that our local investments, all in CDs, are not giving us the best return on our funds, the question was brought up that, as these mature, we might wish to invest them in a ratio just the reverse of our funds with The Mother Church -- 35% in stocks and 65% in bonds. This would give us a balanced situation with our investments. Because we have a number of CDs maturing throughout this year and next, it would be done gradually. The Chairman presented a listing of 9 investment assumptions we might consider, and a proposal regarding possible investments.

Discussion followed, and the names of several brokers were presented -- Jim Keil with Robinson/Humphrey in Marietta and Bill Baird with Prudential Securities. Motion carried to appoint a Committee, consisting of Susan Irby, Lou Lamb, and John Tegtmeyer, to talk to these two brokers and see what is available. This was later modified that Lou would contact Bill Baird and John would call Jim Keil. They would then both report to Susan.

Dear Friends:

With regret we must inform you that we are not attending the Association day this year. After much prayerful consideration we have arrived at the decision that to attend, with the speaker chosen, would not be in our best interest for our growth in Christian Science.

In choosing a speaker who has been removed from office as a Committee on Publication for dissident actions, we feel that the Executive Committee of this Association has made a grave mistake. Article XXVI, Sect.6 of The Church Manual states, "The associations of the pupils of Loyal teachers shall convene annually" (emphasis added). Certainly, the requirement to be loyal should also rest on the speaker to associations whose teacher is no longer with them. Article XXVII, Sect 2, of the Church Manual, in speaking of the person chosen to conduct the meetings of the association, states "an experienced Christian Scientist, ... who is ready for this high calling" (emphasis added). An individual who is a dissident is not ready for the high ralling.

Last year, the Executive Committee made recommendations that potential speakers answer questions before being fully considered, perhaps these potential speakers should be asked if they are LOYAL to our leader and to The Manual.

Of one thing each member of this Association can be sure, our beloved teacher, Mr. Bowles was lojal to our Leader and to her form of church government including the Christian Science Board of Directors (CSBOD). I would recommend that anyone with any doubts on that subject read the letter from the normal class teachers, including Mr. Bowles, written in May 14, 1976 regarding accusations made at that time against the CSBOD by a letter writing campaign.

We pray that this association go forward and each member continues to grow spiritually. We know that aggressive mental suggestion cannot impede the progress of this association or its members and that this association will fulfill its purpose "to provide spiritual growth for them(members)".

The guidelines left to the Committee by Mr. Bowles strengthened that decision. We found Mr. Shepherd's answers to our interview very satisfactory, and his long, dedicated and healing service to the Cause commendable. It may assure you to know that Mrs. Bowles knew of Mr. Shepherd's qualifications and approved of him as an addressor. He had been engaged as the 1994 speaker early in the Executive Committee's administration of the Association and came well recommended.

You spoke frequently in your letter of loyalty. Mrs. Eddy defines loyalty in Retrospection and Introspection on page 50: "By loyalty in students I mean this,—allegiance to God, subordination of the human to the divine, steadfast justice, and strict adherence to divine Truth and Love." This definition of loyalty cannot misjudge in these difficult times when conscientious diversity of views and actions may mislead "even the elect".

Christ Jesus, our Wayshower, gave us guidance for righteous judgment regarding human affairs in Luke 6:44: "every tree is known by his own fruit." The favorable response to the address we received October 15 would indicate that the judgment was sound. We hope you will ask others regarding their experience at Association.

Please be assured that this Executive Committee and past Committees have attempted to conscientiously and prayerfully follow the guidelines left to us for interviewing and selecting appropriate speakers. In last year's mailing to the Association you received the interview questions we use, including a question regarding obedience to the Manual.

that the stocks involved are subject to regular overview by their analysts, who do not anticipate such a deep correction;

that at the present time I/3 of the 30% stock portfolio is in their money market fund (which is itself invested in Treasury bills and repos) and would be available if a correction offered opportunities for purchase of other entities;

that they would, of course, change direction if that was the decision of the Committee.

Both guests were warmly thanked for their informative contributions and concerns. They then withdrew from the meeting.

After our guests left, some suggestions were offered in response to the whole situation:

- I We still have two CDs that might be put into Treasury bills as they mature: \$27,000 plus matures on 7-8-95 and \$26,000 plus matures on 4-6-96.
- 2 -Considerable thought and prayer had been put into drafting our Investment Policy Statement.
- 3 Out of consideration for Mike Long's concerns, perhaps Jim Keel should be asked to work up the figures as to what the realized losses and other costs would be if liquidation of the Mid-America stock portfolio took place.
